DEPOT STREET CLOGGED NIGHTS

CHAGRIN AND DISSATISFACTION EXPRESSED BY LADIES.

Thoroughfare to Depot and Theatre Is Congested with Loiterers.

Intermittent danger of serious outbreaks between strikers and strike-breakers on Depot street last night led to much complaint at the carelessness of the patrolmen to keep Depot street free of loiterers. It appears that several strikebreakers donned war paint and policemen soon found that they were looking for trouble and naturally found it, or would have found it but for intervention of officers. As a consequence, Depot street, the only plausible thoroughfare to the depot and to the Isis theatre, was the scene of congested crowds, congregating and loitering to the embarrassment of ladies and men intent on their own business affairs. Considerable chagrin was expressed at the lack of clear sidewalks all along the street. By careful scrutiny of brewing developments, the police were able to prevent any actual outbreak between strikers and strike-breakers.

Insurgent Woodmen Organize.

Columbus, Neb., March 18.—A convention of representatives of the Nebraska local camps of the Modern Woodmen of America met here today to make protest against the increase in insurance rates recently announced by the head camp of the order. A state organization of the insurgents is to be formed for affiliation with the national committee that is conducting the campaign against the rate increase.

Strike Crisis Near.

London, March 18.—All England is eagerly awaiting the fate of the minimum wage bill which will be introduced by Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer. On the outcome will hinge the life of the coal miners' strike, involving more than a million men, which is causing untold distress to millions more.

It is generally admitted that the Liberals will be forced to muster their full strength to pass the measure.

Members of the labor party are fighting it, believing the measure is intended as an opening wedge for compulsory arbitration of all industrial disputes.

SALT LAKE, IDAHO AND OREGON REPRESENTED.

Farmers Demand a Parcels Post.

Madison, Wis., March 18.—In pursuance of an organized movement started some time ago, thousands of Wisconsin farmers today observed "parcels post referendum day" by writing letters to their representatives in congress asking for a genuine parcels post law. In support of their demand the leaders of the movement point out that there are about 42 rural mail carriers, who travel altogether nearly a million miles each day, dropping mail into about four million rural mail boxes. This service causes a loss to the government of about half a million dollars each week. The average outward load of the rural mail carrier is only about 25 pounds and the return load less than five pounds. With the real parcels post, it is argued, this load would be increased several fold, the farmers would have an express service connecting them with the villages and cities, and the great deficit incident to the present imperfect rural mail service would be wiped out.

Duchess of Argyll's Birthday

London, March 18.—The Duchess of Argyll, daughter of the late Queen Victoria and aunt of King George V., entered upon her 65th year today and received the congratulations of the royal family and many friends. Princess Louise, as she was before her marriage, was born in Buckingham Palace March 18, 1843, and was married in 1871 to the Marquis of Lorne, who subsequently succeeded his father to the title of Duke of Argyll.
