Gen. George P. Harrison.

Gen. George P. Harrison, one of the few surviving generals of the Confederate States army, was born near Savannah, Ga., March 19, 1841. At the beginning of the civil war he and his father entered the confederate army and both rose to the rank of brigadier general. The son was a colonel before he was 20 years of age and a brigadier general before he was 22, the youngest brigadier general commissioned by the confederate government. After the war he removed to Alabama, where he attained distinction as a lawyer. He served several terms in the Alabama legislature and one term as a member of congress. General Harrison is a lineal descendant of Benjamin Harrison of Virginia, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence.

To Test Murderer's Sanity.

Salem, Va., March 19.—The commission composed of Dr. W. F. Drewry and Dr. J. C. King, which is charged with examining into the sanity of Joshua R. Raines, the confessed slayer of Miss Eva M. Chambers, a school teacher of Roanoke county, resumed its work here today after an intermission of two weeks and heard a number of witnesses. Upon the result of the investigation and the report of the commission it will depend whether Raines will have to stand trial for the murder of Miss Chambers or whether he will be sent to the state institution for the insane.

Raines is a prosperous farmer of Roanoke county and lived with his wife and children near Cave Spring. Some time ago gossip led to differences between Raines and Miss Chambers. Raines tried to have her removed from the school but failed. The situation was aggravated by the fact that Miss Chambers filed a suit against Mrs. Raines, asking \$10,000 damages for alleged slander. On the day of the murder, January 24, of this year, asked her to drop her suit against Mrs. Raines. Before the murderer gave himself up he went to a neighbor's farm and fired five shots at a man named Charles Day, with whom he had had some difficulty. One of the shots hit Day in the right arm. Raines made no effort to flee, but voluntarily surrendered to the sheriff, confessing his crime, but refusing any additional information.

American Railway Engineers Meet.

Chicago, March 19.—Many noted railway engineers connected with the large railway systems of the United States and Canada are in attendance at the 13th annual convention of the American Railway Engineering association which opened here today at the Congress hotel and annex for a three days' session. The opening session was devoted to the annual address of the president, reports of officers and the consideration of some of the 21 standing and special committees. The principal feature of general interest will be the banquet tomorrow evening, when the members and guests will be addressed by L. F. Loree, president of the Delaware and Hudson Co., New York; Hon. F. D. Monk, K. C.; M. P., minister of public works in the dominion cabinet, Ottawa, Ont.; Ray Morris, banker and director of the Railway Age Gazette, New York.
