Next Sunday evening J. E. Stevenson, chairman of the La Grande committee will address the Island City people on the coming Men and Religion Forward campaign at La Grande.

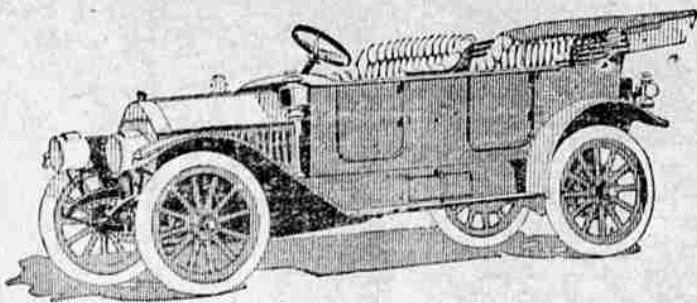
