LEBRUNTROUPE PLEASES CRITIC

Criticism on the Le Brun Grand Opera company, coming to the Steward April 1st, that is of deep interest locally, is contained in a newspaper article from Olympia, Washington, where Mme. Le Brun appeared a few days ago. Those who contemplate attending the production in La Grande, would do well to read the appended: **Opera Delights Large Audience.**

Before the biggest house of the season, drawn by the Redpat-Priest Lyceum bureau series given under the auspices of the Olympia Y. M. C. A., the Le Brun Grand Opera company, the closing attraction of the year, made a decided hit last evening at the Olympia theatre. With a well balanced company equipped with excellent voices displaying not only steadiness but fine timbre and a wide range, the selections from "Martha" and "Il Trovatore" were decidedly well worth hearing.

Mme. Antoinette Le Brun, who essayed the leading roles in both selections has a most pleasing voice and a personality that is delightful and magnetic. Her singing was considered a rare treat by the lovers of vocal music who heard her and she appeared to advantage in every number. Miss Dorothy Wilson, the contralto, is the possessor of a particularly strong voice and her enunciation was a treat, while Arthur Dean and Fritz N. Hüttmann in the male roles were pleasing as they carried the tenor and bass parts extremely well.

Grand opera in English is something of a novelty, not only in Olympia, but elsewhere, and the big house last evening showed that the innovation has great possibilities. The printing of the synopsis of the stories portrayed and the singing of the parts in English added greatly to the enjoyment of the uninitiated who thoroughly appreciated the efforts. It can be said without fear of contradiction that the Le Brun Grand Opera company scored a complete success last evening and that the entertainment brought to a successful close a Lyceum bureau course that has been extremely popular.

The entire program was given with true artistic feeling. The most prominent features in the opera "Martha" were the rendition of the "Spinning Wheel Quartette," "The Last Rose of Summer," and the finale, "Cruel One May Dreams Transport Thee." The "Miserere" will long be remembered by those who were fortunate enough to be in attendance at the concert.
