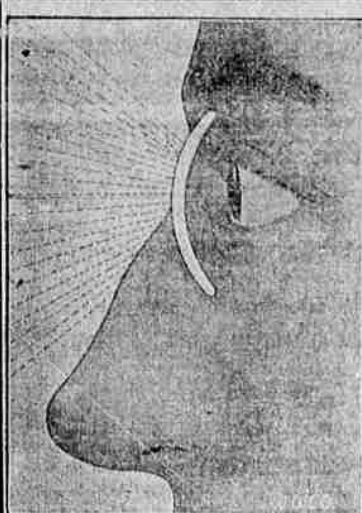

CORNERSTONE IS LAID TODAY

PMMP AND DIGNITY ATTEND COR-
NERSTONE LAYING.

Attendance From State at Pendleton
Today Is Big.

Pendleton, March 26.—(Special)—
Pendleton is buzzing with excitement
today over the successful program
attending the laying of the corner-
stone for the new Eastern Oregon asy-
lum. With big delegations from Salem,

Portland, La Grande and a score of
intermediate cities and towns, the
concourse of people present was big.
Commencing at 12:30 this afternoon
a big parade started toward the build-
ing site which is considerably out of
town.

As the parade reached the south
end of Main street, autos bearing
the officials spun into the vacant tract
between the fair pavilion and the
freight depot. From these autos the
parade was reviewed by the officials.
The remainder of the autos crossed
the railroad tracks and lined up on
the farthest side to await the depar-
ture of the first train which took the
children, the bank and the W. O. W.
team to the asylum grounds.

After the first train bearing the
children, band and degree team left
for the grounds the auto parade to
the grounds was then taken up. Those
not riding to the grounds in autos
took the second train which ran to the
grounds as soon as the equipment
could be gotten back.

Pendleton.
Music—Roundup band.

Address—Ben W. Olcott, secretary
of state.
Address—Thomas B. Kay, state
treasurer.

Address—R. E. L. Steiner, superin-
tendent of state hospital.
Address—J. F. Robinson, president
Pendleton Commercial association.
Music.

Evening Reception.
In the evening a reception is to be
given in honor of the governor and
other visitors at the Eagles-Wood-
men hall.

Colon R. Eberhard, receiver of the
United States land office here, went
to Pendleton this morning and George
T. Cochran is already there. The
lateness of No. 17 was responsible for
the lack of a large number attending
as originally outlined. Dr. W. D. Mc-
Millan, C. E. Cochran, Ed Givens and
a large number of other men had
planned the trip but were frustrated
by the non-arrival of the train—in
time to reach the Pendleton festivi-
ties.

AN OPEN LETTER

Addressed to the Editor of the Pilot
Rock Record.

Elgin, March 8.—(Editor Record)—
In answer to an article in your last is-
sue I desire to say that I oppose Ben
Selling for United States senator for
the sole reason that he betrayed the
interests of the working people of
this state by voting at the request of
certain Portland manufacturers,
against Senator Dimick's eight hour
bill.

N. J. Sinnott of The Dalles, who is
a candidate for the republican nomi-
nation for congress, said of this bill:
"The bill stands for the interests of
a better race, a better manhood and
a better womanhood and I am going to
vote for it. The other day when the
bill for the abolishing of capital pun-
ishment was under consideration I
heard some of the senators extend
much concern and anxiety for red
handed murderers and I am going to
ask them to stretch it so as to extend
it to a people whose conditions are
intolerable."

The bill provided that whenever a
manufacturing concern runs its ma-
chines over 23 hours per day it shall
run three shifts of equal hours. The
Willamette Paper and Pulp company
at Oregon City, an institution that
has accumulated great wealth by mon-
opolizing the water power of Willam-
ette Falls, works its men 10, 14 and
24 hours per day—this latter when a
change of shifts is made. Mr. Sell-
ing's course in this bill was absolute-
ly crooked and unfair, and he used his
power as president of the senate in
an attempt to defeat it. The editor
of the Pilot Rock Record was for
many years a member of the Typo-
graphical union and work mate of
the editor of the Record. It is in-
comprehensible to us how he can sup-
port Ben Selling for United States
senator.

We plead guilty to having been at
one time a member of the Oregon
legislature, nominated by an old fas-
hioned convention. That was before
the new method was adopted. In an-
swer to the Record's question as to
our record in that body, we will give
it very briefly:

Introduced and secured the passage
of a bill reducing by \$10,000 the sal-
aries of Marion county officials.

Added materially in the passage of
the Oregon text book commission bill,
breaking up the monopoly of the Am-
erican Book concern.

Introduced the bill providing for
the execution of murderers at the peni-
tentiary instead of at the different
county seats.

Introduced and secured the passage
of the bill remodeling the state board
of agriculture, making it non-partisan
and providing that no more than one
member should come from any one
county.

Worked and voted for the scalp
bounty on coyotes, which, if it had

been retained would have caused their
extermination and been a great bless-
ing to Eastern Oregon.

Worked and voted for a bounty on
sugar beets, in order to establish the
beet sugar industry in Eastern Ore-
gon.

If any fuller information is wanted
our Pilot Rock friend can dig it up
out of the journals of the legislature.

We have voted the republican ticket
in state and national matters since
the McKinley-Bryan campaign and
have been a resident of Oregon for
about 30 years. The law provides the
residential qualifications of candidates
for office and the people of this dis-
trict can be trusted to take care of
their political affairs without the in-
terference of our friend at Pilot Rock.
