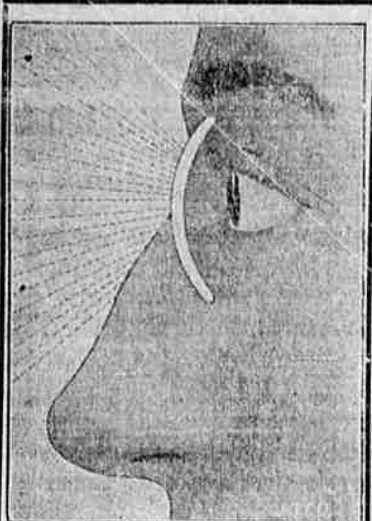

INITIATE FOR UNIFORM RATE

INITIATIVE PETITIONS IN CITY
FOR SIGNERS.

Uniform Rate Measure Reaches La
Grande in Initial State.

Initiative petitions that if properly
filled out and filed will be placed on
the general election ballots a propo-
sition of establishing uniform railroad
freight rates in Oregon by the initia-
tive method, are being circulated in La
Grande today. Baker's Commercial
club has taken the initiative in this
matter in Eastern Oregon and has for-
warded blank petitions to La Grande
for signatures. The petition recites in
its title, "An act to provide uniform
percentage in the relationship of the
classification ratings, providing for
the establishment of minimum carload
weights, to fix the maximum rate on
a basis of less than carload rate of
the article and the minimum carload
weight that may be charged on car-
load shipments of property, defining
the rating upon which the carload
rate shall be computed and prescrib-
ing penalties for violations of the pro-
visions of this act."

The aim of the classification ratings
of freight is that they shall bear a
uniform relationship of one class to
another class and the percentage of
the first class shall be 100 and the
other classes shall be the following
percentages of the first class:
Classes 1 2 3 4 5 A B C D E
Percentages 100 84 70 59 50 42 35 29 24 20

The measure then proceeds with de-
scription of rules governing minimum
carload lots, the actual weight, etc.

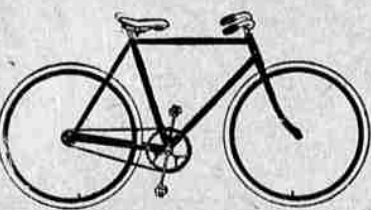
