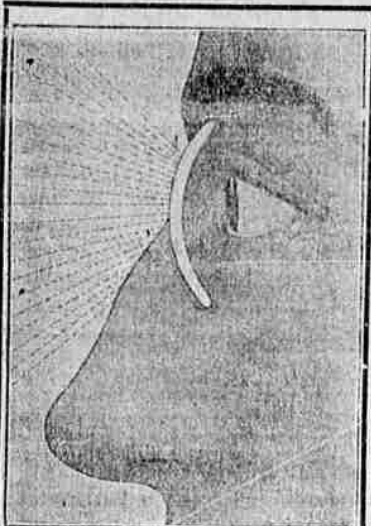

from Walla Walla and receive the in-
spiration of their talks, the commit-
tee has arranged to serve dinner in
the dining room of the Baptist church

and board. One home is to furnish
meals for six boys. The time is get-
ting short and those who will enter-
tain a visiting boy or two should let
the committee know at once.

VETERAN STAGE DRIVER BACK

OLD TIME MOUNTAIN STAGE DRIV-
ER VISITS HERE.

Was Deemed Most Fearless Man of
His Type Then Employed in State.

George Quimby, the oldest living
stage driver that in the early days
took a stage across the Blue Moun-
tains between La Grande and Pendle-
ton is a visitor in Island City where
he has property. He was formerly a
resident of La Grande but now lives
in Portland.

It is said of Mr. Quimby by those
who knew him in the early seventies,
that he was one of the most fearless
and daring stage drivers in this sec-
tion of the country. He drove stage
long before there were any railroads
in this part of the country and when
La Grande was where Old Town now
is.

An incident of the troublous Indian
uprisings is told to illustrate Mr.
Quimby's fearlessness. It is told of
him that he was the only man who
would take a stage across the moun-
tains during the last of all the Indian
outbreaks which occurred in 1878. He
drove through to Pendleton with six
horses making the journey safely in
face of great danger.

DAVIN ESCAPES JAIL.

Court Rules Counsel Were Unauthorized
but Acted in Good Faith.

This afternoon at 3 o'clock Judge
Knowles rendered a decision in the
habeas corpus proceedings brought
by Frank Davin, sustaining the writ.

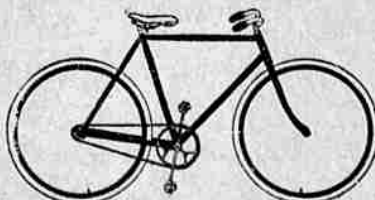
In rendering his decision Judge
Knowles said that from the testimony
it appeared to him as though Mr. Davin
had knowledge of the indictment
returned against him by the Walla
Walla county grand jury as he was closely
connected with both Staats and Mich-
ellod who were jointly indicted on the
charge of the illicit sale of liquor.

The judge exonerated Jerry Rusk,
A. M. Rannels and D. W. Sheahan
for appearing in the case for Davin.
He said that it appeared to him that as
these men had been employed by Davin,
Staats and Michellod in other
matters and they apparently acted in
good faith in appearing for Davin be-
lieving they had been retained as at-
torneys for him but in reality had no
authority to appear for Mr. Davin in
this case.

Judge Knowles said this afternoon
that hereafter he would adopt a rul-
ing requiring every attorney who ap-
peared for a defendant who was not
present in court to show a signed
statement investing authority in the
attorney.

Davin, consequently was discharged
from going to jail and paying the fine
under the judgment entered hereto-
fore.
