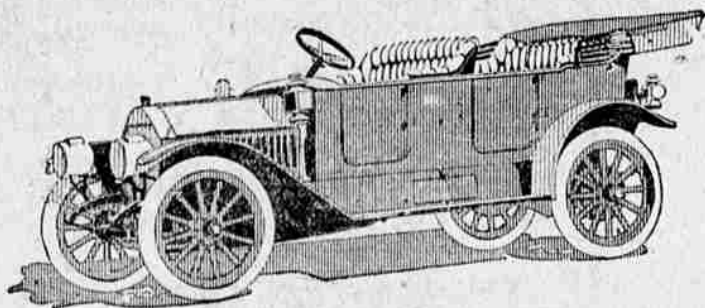

Representative Frank Clark of Florida, who started the Everglades land controversy by accusing Secretary of Agriculture Wilson of suppressing land circulars intended to protect the public, was born in Eufaula, Alabama, March 28, 1860, and received his education in the public schools of Alabama and Georgia. He was admitted to the bar in 1881, and has since been engaged in the practice of law in Florida. His public career began with his election to the Florida legislature. He served three terms as a member of that body and later became United States district attorney for the southern district of Florida. Mr. Clark has represented the Second Florida district in the lower house of congress since 1905.

MEAT HIGHER, SUGAR LOWER

FRIDAY NIGHT FINDS PLENTY OF CRISP GREENS.

General Increase Noted In All Lines of Meat Quotations.

General incline upwards in meat is the synopsis of the meat market quotations today. During the past few days practically every item of meats has taken a slight raise. Vegetables continue to hold a firm and even price with the markets well provided with either out of state or home-grown lettuce, radishes and other vegetables. The month of March has been exceptionally well provided for in the vegetable line and every Friday evening finds the merchants laying in stocks for the Saturday buyers that are crisp and fresh.

Sugar has gone down again, and a 20 per cent cut has been lopped off in the past few days. The corrected quotations for local markets follows:
