CANAL GROWS IN LENGTH FAST

ONE MILE OF TOTAL OF TEN IS COMPLETED TODAY.

Main Canal of Irrigation Project is Being Dug With Rapidity.

By tonight an even mile of main canal will have been dug by the Port-

land concern digging the trenches for the Grande Ronde Valley Irrigation company. The first shovel of dirt was dug from what is known as the marshes and the diggers are now working towards the further end of the main canal which will be about 10 miles long when completed and will carry flood waters from the Grande Ronde river near the old sugar factory site, to barren and semi-arid land lying between here and Cove. About 10,000 acres will be watered in this way.

"Dirt is flying in fine shape," announced J. D. McKennon this morning, Mr. McKennon being a director and an officer in the company. "We are making splendid headway with the work."

HORSES SHIPPED OUT.

Carload Destined for Alberta and One Carload Goes to Salem.

County Stock Inspector P. A. Charlton today gave bills of health to two carloads of horses shipped out of the county. Taxes Paid Rapidly.

The amount of taxes collected before the 15th of March this year exceeds the amount collected before the 15th of March last year by about \$35,000. A much greater number of taxpayers took advantage of the three per cent rebate this year and although the tax roll of 1911 is nearly \$80,000 larger than that of 1910, the balance to be collected is approximately \$15,000 less than it was at this time last year.

Makers of Cotton Goods Meet.

Washington, April 2.—One thousand manufacturers of cotton goods, representing many sections of the country, were on hand this morning when the American Cotton Manufacturers' association began its 16th annual convention at the Raleigh hotel in this city. The meeting will last for three days. Most important of the subjects which will come before the association will be the report of the special committee appointed to investigate the effects that the proposed tariff changes may have on the cotton industry.
