EASTERN MAIL HAS ARRIVED

DELAYED PASSENGERS AND MAIL REACH OREGON.

Four Passenger Trains Required to Handle Congested Business.

Crippled mail service and passenger traffic between Chicago and the Pacific coast has been completely recuperated today. Four sections of No. 3, last night's west bound passed through La Grande during the morning hours, bringing the last of the congested mail and delayed passengers. The Chicago mail has been tied up several days owing to the destructive floods in the Mississippi river basin shutting off Chicago from the western states. No. 17 was four hours late, but after today it is anticipated that conditions will be normal again. In view of the slight improvement noted by press dispatches from the scene of the trouble today. The excess number of passenger trains handled today necessitate shifting of regular runs, and Conductor Cherry on the Pendleton Motor ran brought No. 6 through this morning.
