Passaic, April 6.—The police authorities here today refused to confirm or deny the report that a warrant has been issued for the arrest of William D. Haywood, the labor leader who is prominent in the textile strikes of the east. The report of Haywood's arrest followed the rioting at Garfield near here. Haywood is expected soon to leave for Grays Harbor, Washington, and Tacoma, to take charge of the lumber strikes in those places.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 21st day of February 1912, creating improvement district No. 46, and designating G avenue as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 21st day of February 1912, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of G avenue in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon the south side board walk, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of G avenue from the east side of Fourth street to the Masonic cemetery.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

All the lots abutting on the south side of G avenue to from the east line of Fourth street to the Masonic cemetery.
