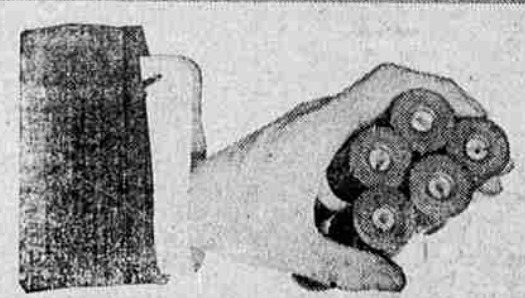
COUNCILMEN ON JOURNEY
