47 KNIGHTS GO TO BAKER

THREE OTHER TOWNS HAVE KNIGHTS PRESENT.

Special Train Run From La Grande to Easter Services Yesterday.

Forty-seven Knights Templar, Eastern Oregon commandery, helmeted and uniformed and brilliant in their regalia, accompanied by a large number of ladies, were conspicuous for their numbers and excellency of drill in the big Easter services conducted by the Baker Knights yesterday at which Pendleton, La Grande and Weiser Knights were guests of honor. A special train was run out of here early yesterday morning and the Pendleton Knights' car was switched on at this point and Union Knights were gathered up at that point. The ritualistic Easter services exemplified with embellishments here last year, were carried out at Baker, and in all 114 plumed Knights were in the marching line. An elaborate banquet was served in the Geiser Grand at 8 o'clock last evening and during the course of appropriate speeches, W. T. Wright of Union and George Cochran of this city were heard with good effect.

The special returned to La Grande at 12:10 last night.

Unsign Letter to Strike Leader Orders His Departure From City. NOTICE TO LEAVE GIVEN ALEXANDER. We have decided that this city can do very nicely without your esteemed presence so take this means of notifying you that if you are out of here by Monday next nothing will be done but should you refuse we will find some way to take you out of sight at least and the attitude of both city and county court you will admit makes it very favorable. Monday on No. 6 will do but not later as after that the papers will be served. CITIZENS' COMMITTEE.

Ordered to leave immediately on threats of forcible removal or prosecution in courts, by a letter purporting to come from a "Citizens' Committee," L. G. Alexander, leader of the striking shopmen's federation here, has defied his threateners to "do their worst," and notwithstanding that the time limit expressed in the note has expired, Alexander is still in the city and says he intends to remain.

The letter has no date line, is written with typewriter and the signature is in typewriting eliminating the possibility of clues arising from handwriting. The letter was addressed to "Fatty Alexander" and came through the mails in that way, reaching Mr. Alexander speedily. "I defy the writer to make known his identity or to carry out his threats," said Mr. Alexander this afternoon in commenting on the reception of the note. "I have nothing to fear in the courts and certainly have nothing to fear from the coward who wrote me that letter."

Every avenue known to escape detection was adopted and the most careful scrutiny of the missive failed to detect any mark of identification. Mr. Alexander has been on the streets all afternoon and late today had seen nothing more or heard anything that might lead him to believe his personal safety is in danger.

"I haven't the least conception of who wrote it but I do say that I am here and will reiterate my def for any man or body of men to remove me from La Grande."

During his stay in La Grande which is measured by the life of the machinist strike still under way, Alexander has been closely affiliated with the administration of local strike matters and has taken active part throughout. It is believed the sender of the letter may be some disgruntled personage who failed the vigilante feature or another construction that might be placed upon it is the likelihood of it being the trick of some practical joker who thought to not only frighten Alexander but also put him to inconvenience.

The police have been advised of the matter and the attention of Mayor Church has been called to the missive.
