COLON M'SHAIN MEETS DEATH

YOUNG MAN CUT TO PIECES AT TELOCASSET.

Relatives Reside at Elgin, La Grande, Walla Walla and Starkey.

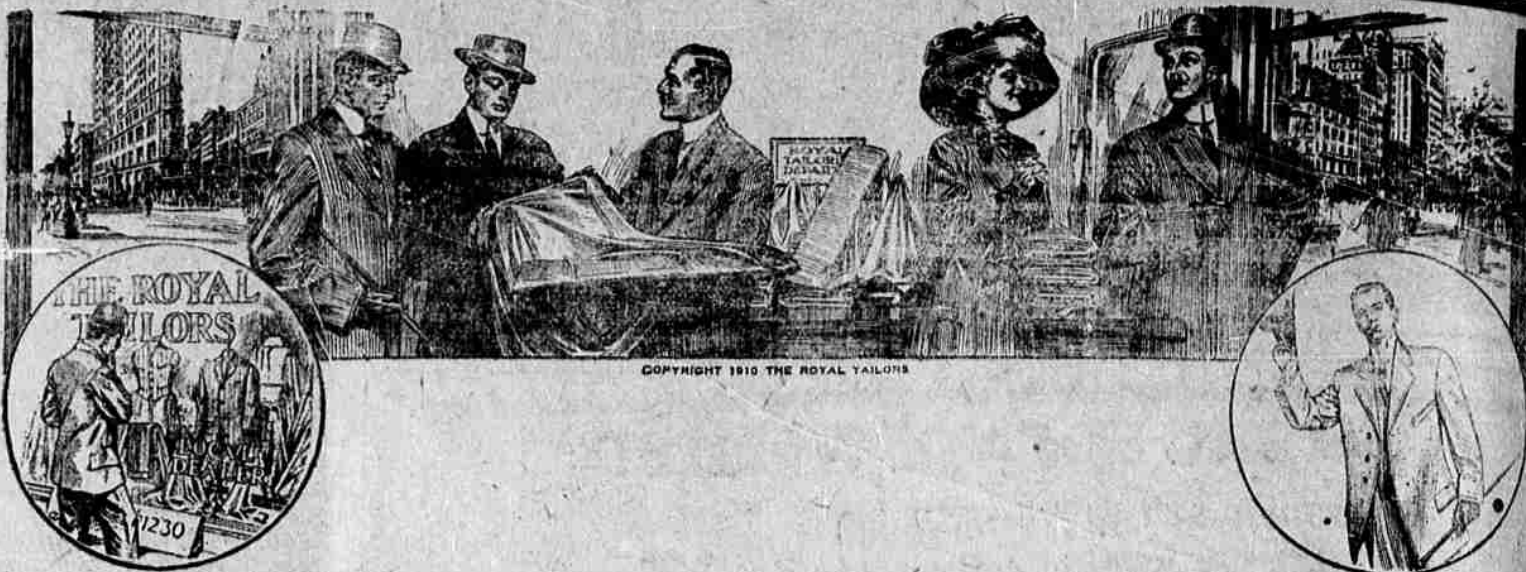
Instant death was the fate of Colon McShain, aged 26 years, at Telocasset yesterday morning when a saw mill carriage against which he was leaning is said to have gotten out of control and carried the young man into the saw with instantaneously fatal results. His body was terribly mangled by the teeth of the saw and death was instantaneous. The remains were brought to La Grande yesterday and prepared for interment at Elgin this afternoon by the Henry & Carr undertakers.

Colon McShain was the son of Mrs. Emma McShain of Elgin and a brother of Conductor Jim McShain of this city. In addition, another brother, George McShain, and three sisters, namely Mrs. Jennie M. Powell, of Walla Walla, Miss Ollie McShain of Elgin and Miss Flora McShain, a school teacher at Starkey, survive.

GEO COCHRAN CAREER PRAISED

PENDLETON PAPER DRAWS EDITORIAL COMPARISONS.

Goes Over Political Career of Geo. T. Cochran With Words of Praise.

Under the caption, "Words, Deeds, and Farmers" the Pendleton Live Wire of a recent date says in its editorial columns of the fight of George T. Cochran of this city for congress, that paper having come to the support of the La Grande attorney as have several other publications in Umatilla county:

The trouble with a local contemporary which advocates the nomination of Rusk by republicans for congressman is its short memory. The Portland Telegram of February 13, 1911, tells the story of Rusk killing the flat salary bill and two days later, under the headlines of "stormy scenes on closing day—Speaker Rusk deserts chair under whip of governor" that paper tore the false cloak of "progressiveness" from the shoulders of the speaker and revealed him in his true light. The Oregonian of February 19, 1911, reported practically the same news. If our democratic contemporary will send a representative over to Wallowa county on a still hunt or interview three-fourths of the members of the last legislature it will change its classification of Rusk as a progressives or its definition of the word.

A real record for genuine progressive achievement such as that held by George T. Cochran speaks more loudly than the mere words of Rusk. It is true enough that Mr. Cochran was nominated for water superintendent for Eastern Oregon while attending strictly to his business in North Powder on that day. He accepted the nomination and coupled sterling qualities with a tremendous capacity for hard work so successfully that his official conduct of that office has earned for him the admiration and good will of all with whom he has had dealings.

Ask irrigationists what they think of George Cochran. They are in a position to judge of

actual fruits of his labors. They know that he has "delivered the goods" as water commissioner and they believe that he will do so as representative in congress. They are judging men by deeds and not words and after all "standpat" and "assembly" are only mere words that can be twisted to any use. The money Mr. Cochran's administration of his office has placed in the pockets of the water users speaks much more eloquently to them than the terrific tax burden they bear as a result of the activities of that same "progressive" legislature of which his "progressive" opponent was a member.
