### PHILIPPINE SAVAGES.

The Uncouth Tingians Are Fond of Ornaments and Gay Colors.

There are many strange, uncivilized people among the Asiatic Americans of the Philippine Islands.

The Tingians are a very uncouth tribe of savages. Their head women have their arms almost completely covered with strings of beads, wound so as to form beautiful and striking designs. A long, heavy string of beads is also twisted around the hair and hangs down the back like a braid. The skirt of these head women is white, with a blue border, and the waist is of light yellow. They smoke pipes of solid silver, ornamented with bangles, in the bowls of which pieces of cigar are inserted.

The typical young Tingian chieftain wears a stiff collar of beads and a gayly colored calico shirt, over which is a sort of scarf trimmed with many silver coins. The members of this tribe are very fond of silver. They make a large number of finger rings from silver coins, and each man usually has from five to ten of these rings about his person, but not necessarily on his fingers.

The Tingians are fond of a peculiar dance. The music is produced by beating with the palms of the hands on "gansas" or tomtoms. The dancers, a man and a woman, with arms outstretched, circle about each other in a spiral, the man pursuing the woman with a quick, jerky step. As they approach the center of the spiral he suddenly swoops upon her, when she always eludes him by suddenly darting out of his reach.—Forrest Clark in Leslie's.

## WILLIAM SHAW MUST BE HANGED

Walla Walla, Wn., April 10.—(Special)—"Gilty of murder in the first degree."

Such was the verdict arrived at last night after three hours of deliberation by the twelve men selected in the local superior court to try the case of William Johnson Shaw, the negro charged with killing his wife, Alice Shaw, in this city February 27, at the home of Attorney John Sharpstein.

The case went to the jury at 4:15 yesterday afternoon and at 7:15 the foreman, Campbell Robinson, notified the balliffs that they had arrived at a verdict. During their deliberations, four ballots were taken, the first vote showing eight for conviction of the charge of murder in the first degree and four for murder in the second. On the second ballot all but one juror voted for first degree murder, the result remaining the same on the third. Another discussion of the case ensued and on the fourth and last ballot the result was unanimous for first degree murder.

The case will probably be appealed.

The reading of the verdict occurred 15 minutes later in the courtroom in the presence of Judge T. H. Brents, the defendant and his attorney, F. A. Garrecht, newspaper men, a few of county officials and spectators.

Throughout the brief but solemn proceedings attending the announcement of the verdict, William J. Shaw, the prisoner, displayed the greatest composure. When the sealed verdict, which had been opened and read silently by Judge T. H. Brents, was read aloud in turn by County Clerk E. L. Casey, Shaw's expression did not manifest the least emotion. After the reading he turned to his counsel, Attorney F. A. Garrecht, and said:  
"I thank you, Mr. Garrecht, for what you have done for me."

He then waited in silence until he was led out of the courtroom and back to the county jail by Sheriff Mike Toner.

Following the reading of the verdict, Judge Brents announced that he would pronounce sentence on Shaw Friday morning at 10 o'clock, after
