with a capitalization of 31 billions of dollars.

"Rough Rider" Not Fitted.

"To my mind these are the main issue before the American people today. They have developed and waxed strong until they are entwined in legitimate business and it is too late for any president to begin to thrust and cut at random. The day of that sort of hacking passed during Roosevelt's early presidential career. Now it is the subject for the most delicate of surgery that statesmanship knows. It is no job for a rough rider, Roosevelt preached against the trusts and urged for their destruction, but he did not act.

"Roosevelt isn't never was and never will be a constructive statesman. He is one of the greatest moral agitators the world has ever known. For this we must give him credit.

"No man since Buchanan has done so much to Mexicanize America as Roosevelt.

"The first thing I would have done would have been to call in all of the district attorneys of the United States and give them each a copy of the Sherman act. I would have presumed that they had not seen it before, would have given them 90 days to work in and if there had been a trust in the United States after that I'd have removed every man from attorney general down.

Health Unimpaired.

That "Robert" is not ill and probably never was, he assured his audience when he said:

"They are talking about my condition. Why, here a short time ago a man named Pinchot—do you know him?—came up into Dakota and started to preach against me. I was surprised because I thought he would preach for me. He explained it to the people like this: 'When you are running a train and the engine gets disabled, you have to change engines.'

"I took up his trail in North Dakota and demonstrated to the people that my drive wheels were working fine, my firebox was in good shape and I had lots of sand in my sandbox."

EASTERN VOTE SATISFIES.

La Follette and McCusker Much Elated Over So-Called Deadlock.

After the speech news of Pennsylvania's vote in favor of Roosevelt was received with unstinted expressions of delight by La Follette. He analyzed the situation to his hearers, intimating a dark-horse in the shape of Hughes, or himself, would be nominated at Chicago. With the number of delegates instructed and urged for Taft, the number obtained for Roosevelt, and the number held for La Follette, combined with those yet to be determined, the senator reached the above conclusions. Mr. La Follette's manager, Mr. McCusker, who is touring the state with La Follette, was equally enthusiastic over what he termed a deadlock in the Taft-Roosevelt race.

Mrs. R. M. La Follette was here from Madison, Wis., Saturday evening for a few hours. She went immediately to her room in the Sommer hotel and remained there until the arrival of the train about 3 o'clock Sunday morning. When Mrs. La Follette delivered her address in behalf of woman suffrage at Pendleton Saturday afternoon, it was the first time that her husband had heard her platform efforts on that subject.

"She did mighty well, too," vouchsafed the senator at the Sommer in standing guard against interviews with Mrs. La Follette who, unused to travelling, was fatigued and retired at once.
