Careful Study of Train Service on the Branch Line to Be Made in Interim

O'Neill will hold a conference with the members and directors of the La Grande Commercial club relative to the securing of better and different train service on branch line points. Wallawa county people will be asked to express any desire they may want in the way of changed passenger and freight train service and La Grande will act in conjunction with the "other end" requests. It is believed that the O-W will stand ready at that time to do something toward betterment of the branch line service, and the directors will await anxiously what is to be afforded at that time.
