WORLD IS STUNNED

The officials gave out a message confirming the report of the great disaster.

The Titanic catastrophe is the greatest marine disaster in time of peace in the history of the world. The loss of lives and of money, according to the best obtainable reports follows: Lives about 1500. Cost to build Titanic, ten millions of dollars; estimated values of jewels carried by the women passengers, five million; value of baggage, two million; loss in probable law suits and litigation, five million.

The officials say they do not believe any of the missing will be saved saying there is only one chance in a thousand that any other of the steamers may have rescued those aboard the ill-fated liner after the women and children were sent away.

Parliament in Sorrow.

London, April 16.—Premier Asquith of the House of Commons, reported the Titanic disaster. "While sorrowing," he said, "we must nevertheless express our admiration in the carrying out of the best sea traditions, and the saving of those least able to save themselves."

National Academy of Sciences

Washington, D. C., April 16.—With a goodly representation of its membership in attendance, the annual meeting of the National Academy of Sciences, which is classed as one of the most famous scientific bodies in the world, opened at the National Museum here today. It will continue until Thursday. Business meetings and afternoon public sessions for the reading of scientific papers will take place each day.

Washington, D. C., April 16.—Observers of the celestial spheres are today discussing the eclipse of the sun which will occur tomorrow. Theoretically it is a total eclipse, but practically it is not, for the duration of totality will be but a fraction of a second. To the inhabitants of this section of the globe it will be only a partial eclipse, and will be visible only in the eastern states and eastern Canada. Persons living west of a line drawn through Pembina, N. D., Sioux City, Memphis and Pensacola will not be able to witness the phenomenon. Washington astronomers are apathetic regarding the eclipse, for the reason that it will begin before sunrise in this section.
