St. Louis, Mo., April 16.—With many
of the leading bishops, rectors and
laymen of the Episcopal church pres-
ent from all parts of the country, the
annual national Episcopal Church
congress was opened in this city today
with a service of holy communion. The
congress will be in session four days.
The congress, which has no legislative
functions, is held principally to pro-
vide a forum for the free discussion
of live topics by all classes of church-
manship. The principal subjects for
discussion by the present congress are
The good and evil in trades unions,
the sanctity of marriage, the possi-
bility of unity in church government,
official censorship in the interest of
morals, conversion as a Christian ex-
perience, and music as an aid to re-
ligion.

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ROUT OF MR. TAFT ALMOST COMPLETE

ROOSEVELT DELEGATES QUITE
OUTNUMBER OTHER CAN-
DIDATES.

"Teddy" Wins Sweeping Victory in
Illinois and Maine—Taft Has But
44 Delegates; T. R. Has 142
Already.

Convention Delegates.

Following are the numbers of
delegates to the Republican Na-
tional Convention already pledged
to each of the various candi-
dates:
Four hundred and sixty-eight
delegates have been elected.
For Colonel Roosevelt, 142.
W. H. Taft, 44.
Senator Cummins, 4.
Robert La Follette, 36.
Uninstructed, 94.
Contests pending, 148.

PORTLAND.—Any impartial analysis
of the returns on delegates to the
Republican National Convention shows
that the rout of Taft has begun. After
the great Roosevelt victory in Illinois,
in which the people really had an op-
portunity to express themselves, no
reasonable person can doubt that the
ultimate end is the nomination of
Colonel Roosevelt for President.

So completely was Taft defeated in
Illinois that he received but two dele-
gates to Roosevelt's 56—the single
district that Mr. Taft carried being
Senator Lorimer's.

A thorough Roosevelt victory in
Oregon is thus prefigured by all.

Taft Rout is Complete.

Senator Fred W. Mulkey, of Port-
land, Oregon, Roosevelt committee
man, has received the following tele-
gram from Joseph M. Dixon, of Wash-
ington, D. C., the Roosevelt campaign
manager:

"Four hundred and sixty-eight dele-
gates to the Republican National Con-
vention have been elected up to and
including today. Of these, 142 are for
Colonel Roosevelt, 44 for Mr. Taft, 4
for Senator Cummins, 36 for Sen-
ator La Follette, 94 uninstructed, in-
cluding 81 from New York State, and con-
tests are pending in cases of the remaining
148."

"The Taft rout has begun."

"Following the great Roosevelt vic-
tory in Illinois, comes the report of
the Roosevelt victory in Maine. The
action of the Maine Republican state
and district conventions in pledging
by a vote of two to one, their entire
delegation of 12 delegates to the Cin-
cinnati convention for Roosevelt shows
conclusively that the New England
Republicans are keeping step with Illi-
nois and the other Republican States
of the Mississippi Valley in the Roose-
velt column."

New England for T. R.

"The Taft managers have been loud
in proclaiming that New England was
solid for Taft."

"The result in Maine makes their
claim ridiculous."

"In Vermont, Roosevelt takes one-
half of the instructed delegates and
the state convention by a virtual agree-
ment selects two Roosevelt and two
Taft delegates and sends all of them to
Chicago uninstructed. Similar returns
show that Roosevelt carried Illinois by
about 150,000 majority."

"It was a landslide which swept
everything before it, except one dis-
trict, the Fifth, which is Lorimer's."

Taft Loses Own Districts.

"The Illinois delegation to the Na-
tional Convention will be: Roosevelt
16, Taft 2. The districts of ex-Speaker
Cannon and McKinley, the managers of
the Taft propaganda, endorsed Roose-
velt overwhelmingly. McKinley forgoes
his own preference by a two to one vote
after having personally devoted some
time to it. The entire country should
not overlook the significance of Roose-
velt's carrying the ninth congressional
district of Illinois by a vote of over
two to one, in which two of Taft's
cabinet officers, McVeagh of the Treas-
ury, Fisher of the Interior, ex-Secretary
of War Dickinson, Assistant
Treasurer of the National Committee
Upam, ex-Mayor Busse of Chicago,
former Secretary to President Taft,
Morton, Assistant Secretary of Com-
merce and Labor, Nagle, and Taylor,
McVeagh's private secretary, all of
whom were for Taft."

News Forecast for the Coming Week

Washington, D. C., April 15.—Im-
portant fixtures on the political cal-
endar of the week will include the
following:

Monday—Republican territorial
convention of Hawaii, at Honolulu,
to select delegates to the national
convention.

Tuesday—Republican State con-
vention of Connecticut, at New Haven,
to select delegates to the national
convention.

Republican State convention of Del-
aware, at Dover, to select delegates
to the national convention.

Wednesday—District convention of
Republicans in Connecticut to se-
lect delegates to the national con-
vention.

District conventions of all parties
in Illinois to select delegates to the
national conventions.

Democratic State convention of Al-
abama, at Montgomery, to select dele-
gates to the national convention.

Friday—Direct primaries of all parties
in Nebraska to select delegates to
the national conventions and name
candidates for United States Senator
and State officers.

Direct primaries of all parties in
Oregon to select delegates to the na-
tional conventions and express pref-
erence for United States Senator.

State conventions of all parties in
Illinois to select the delegates at-
large to the national conventions.

Nearly all of the presidential as-
pirants will be in the field during the
week. Col. Roosevelt is expected to
confine his activities to the eastern
States. Woodrow Wilson will speak
in Georgia and Florida. Governor
Harmon in the middle West and Sen-
ator La Follette in the far West. Wil-
liam J. Bryan will add to the gayety
of the situation by speaking against
Harmon in the latter's home State.

John Paul Jones, the revolutionary
naval hero, is fixed for Wednesday
and will be made an occasion for im-
pressive military and civic services
in which President Taft and other
notables will take part.

The consecration of Father Austin
Dowling as Roman Catholic bishop of
Des Moines will take place Thursday
in the cathedral in Providence, R. I.,
with Bishop Harkins officiating as
the consecrating prelate.

A central eclipse of the sun is
scheduled to take place early Wednes-
day morning, visible as a partial
eclipse in the eastern portion of the
United States and Canada.

The conventions of the week will in-
clude the Episcopal Church Congress
in St. Louis, the Conservation Con-
gress of the Men and Religion For-
ward Movement in New York City,
the national convention of the Daugh-
ters of the American Revolution in
Washington, and the International

Conference on the Negro at Tuskegee,
Ala.
