HEAVY VOTE IS GENERAL RULE

HITING SNOW STORM DOES NOT PREVENT VOTES.

Cold, Cloudy and Muddy Conditions Generally Not Detrimental.

OBSERVER TO GIVE RETURNS
Every voter interested in the election returns will find the returns at the Observer office to night. The rat bulletin will be read at 9 o'clock and from then on as rapidly as they can be procured from the county, district, and state.

Portland, Ore., April 19.—Voting in the primaries here is light and early hour reports are to the same effect in most places throughout the state. All candidates express confidence.

Brisk voting in the face of an often biting snowstorm characterizes the presidential preference primary and the general primary election in Union county today. In La Grande the vote is heavy in spite of the storm and the only section of Eastern Oregon that may not come up to its total registration strength is Walla Walla county, which, at noon, sent out indications that the vote would be a trifle below normal. Snow covered the ground at Enterprise this morning and farmers were slow in coming in to vote.

At Elgin the weather is more moderate and by noon a large delegation of farmers had cast their votes and

the city was living up to its registration. Allee reported a slow farmer's vote, and Summerville is much in the same class. At Union the farmers' vote is heavier than ordinary and the total strength of 220 in No. 1 and 173 in No. 2, will doubtless be cast before the polls close tonight.

In La Grande there is snip and vim especially in the second ward, and the first vote was cast a moment after the polls were opened.

In No. 2, La Grande, with 233 votes, 173 had been cast at 2:30.
