large vote in Wallowa county as well

as in La Grande. His total majority has not been computed but is quite large.

Close Race for Representative.

Early returns from the county in the Forsstrom-Lambert race was ex-cruciatingly close. At frequent intervals when totals were struck the men were exactly even. North Powder threw an enormous majority to Lambert but Union came back in turn and gave Forsstrom a big majority that caught up with Lambert and the final count shows Forsstrom ahead with a good lead.

Ed Wright, running alone, carried the representative vote of the county. John Frawley ran under similar conditions and of course is nominated. U. G. Couch of Island City is the republican nominee for assessor and Bacon won without opposition. No tabulation has been made of the justice of the peace district candidates, though it is conceded that A. C. Williams is nominated in this section.

J. F. Hutchinson of Union, was nominated without opposition for county commissioner.

In the Democratic Field.

Wilson carried the county by a big majority. Pierce, a favored son, was given a complimentary vote that pleases his friends. Lane was never a factor in the vote at all. The same thing is true in Baker and Wallowa counties especially.

Hodgin Wins Easily.

John S. Hodgin obtains the democratic nomination for joint representative if early indications are correct. He won handsily in Union and Wallowa county returns indicate the same outcome in the race.

Sheriff Race Close.

Another close race that kept interest at white heat last night and this morning was the race between Childers and Gaskill. Childers had a

E. E. Bragg was handsily nominated for democratic school superintendent and David M. Clark running unopposed, was nominated.

DYNAMITE ACCIDENTS.

Some of the Stuff May Remain After a Charge is Exploded.

"It is generally supposed that when a charge of dynamite has exploded it is all over—that the entire charge has been consumed," said a "hard rock" man who has worked in mines, in river tunnels and other places where high explosives are used. "This supposition, however, is not correct," he continued. "Sometimes particles of dynamite will be blown out with the broken rock. Then it becomes a menace to the workmen. It is a favorite practice of men who are waiting or resting to sit on a pile of 'muck' as the broken rock is called, and to jab into it with a pick or a candlestick or some other steel thing, much the same as a Yankee will whistle while he talks or thinks. If the steel strikes one of these bits of dynamite that has not gone off, because the glycerin in it has started to run or because a fragment of it has been crystallized, there will be an explosion. The chances are that not one of the group of men sitting around will escape injury."

"Another frequent cause of accidents is that sometimes when the dynamite explodes and tears out the rock a small quantity of it will be left in the bottom of the drill hole, unaffected by the shock. If the drill hole that remains happens to be pointed in the right direction a lazy drill runner is likely to take advantage of it and start his new hole in the old one in order to make a record or save time. The instant his drill commences to thud on the unexploded dynamite it goes off. The steel is driven back through the barrel of the machine, wrecking it and usually killing the drill runner. This explains many mysterious deaths that have been attributed to 'missed shots.'"
