OREGON HAS SPOKEN.

The people of Oregon have spoken through their ballots, which is the accepted verdict of sentiment throughout the civilized world today. By that ballot the republicans decided on Col. Roosevelt as the man for president, while the democrats have chosen Wilson as their leader. For senator Ben Selling was the choice of republicans

by a large vote and the democrats decided on Dr. Lane of Portland as their candidate. In the Second district republican voters centered upon Nick Sinnott of The Dalles, and so on down the line.

The defeat of Taft is regretted by many and others hold a sincere regret that Senator La Follette did not carry the state, but the fact that Roosevelt sentiment was so pronounced proves beyond question the feeling of the Oregon people regarding the next president. The same sentiment named Ben Selling, a very able citizen, a man who loves Oregon and has all his investments here, a man who has a clean political record—who is thoroughly progressive in every sense and will make good for Oregon at the national capital. Bourne's defeat was very plain. The people do not want a senator who thinks more of selfish popularity than he does of home affairs; whose progressiveness only dated back to a time when it was popular to be a progressive and whose term of office shows much neglect to the state and its interests. It was an act of wisdom to retire Mr. Bourne as will be shown in years to come.

In the Second district republicans have chosen an able man as representative in congress. Nick Sinnott, is just plain Nick wherever you meet him, and he is well grounded in things that bear directly on Eastern Oregon's needs. He had several able opponents and in Union and Wallowa counties especially the boys who ran against Sinnott had many warm friends who would have done a great deal rather than see them defeated. But in politics all cannot win.

Abraham Walter Lafferty is retained to represent Portland in congress, a selection which Portland alone must stand for and which the rest of the state does not share. His selection shows the difference between what voters in a city will do and what voters in the country stand for. Every reader can judge the situation thoroughly for himself, as each knows Lafferty.

In the defeat of Walter M. Pierce for the democratic nomination for senator the Union county democracy expresses a regret, for it was thoroughly believed that Senator Pierce had a good chance to win. He made a

good fight as his state vote will show, but again the Portland instinct relative to politics asserted itself and he was given a very, very light vote in the city.

Probably the prettiest lesson of the whole primary campaign was taught the rich people of Portland, who were almost unanimously for Senator Bourne, and that lesson is to the effect that the remainder of the state outside of Multnomah county must be reckoned with in the future. Ben Selling was nominated by the state outside of the city. His record in the state senate, his early stand for progressive principles, his career as an honest, charitable man appealed to the voter who wants the best man elected, while in the city things are vastly different. The special interests evidently thought they had a friend in Bourne from the way they worked for him, but the special interests, thank heaven are in the minority even in Oregon and as a result Bourne is retired and Selling is the republican nominee.
