NOT BELIEVED SCOTT CARRIED A
PART IN CRIME.

Claims He Believed Razors He Sold
Were Worn Over Gambling Tables.

To all appearances Fred R. Scott
will escape suspicion of any connec-
tion with the Bohnenkamp hardware
store robbery. When he was ar-
raigned jointly with his fellow sus-
pect, Walter R. Davis, last night be-
fore Justice Williams, evidence was
introduced tending to show that Scott
knew nothing of the robbery of the
hardware store of which he and Davis
are accused and for which they were
arrested in Wallula and brought to
La Grande. The evidence against Davis
on the other hand was sufficient
to warrant his appearance before the
grand jury and he was bound over on

says he went to bed leaving Davis at
the gaming table. The next day Davis
gave Scott some knives and razors
to sell, claiming to have won them by
gambling and Scott told some. In
this way he was inveigled into the
mess and his story is corroborated by
Davis who swears that Scott had noth-
ing to do with the robbery itself.
