### Show Easterners the Roundup.

Pendleton, April 24.—In order to give effete easterners a glimpse of the real old wild west, a plan is on foot by the Commercial and Roundup associations to entertain three trainloads of electric company officials and bondholders on June 6 or 7 with a short frontier performance. President Robinson of the former association last evening appointed a committee consisting of Clarence M. Bishop, W. E. Brock, R. Alexander, W. J. Clarke, Leon Cohen, Walter Adams, T. F. O'Brien and Joe Skrabale to act with the Roundup committee in making arrangements for the occasion.

Either on the 6th or 7th day of June, three special trains, one known as the pink, one the blue and the other the orange train, will arrive in Pendleton bearing delegates to a convention of electric bondholders and officials in Seattle and, through the efforts of Dr. F. W. Vincent, manager of the local plant of the P. P. & L. Co., the officers of the Commercial club and Roundup were interested in a plan to get the distinguished capitalists to stop here for a half hour or more.

The Dalles has already laid plans for advertising its community by distributing Bing cherries among the party and Pendleton, not to be outdone, is planning to pull off a stunt, distinctive and significant and something that no other city in the northwest can do as well. Dr. Vincent has already subscribed \$150 toward preparing this wild west treat and another similar contribution will be all that is necessary.
