CLEAN-UP DAY PROVIDED FOR

MAYOR TO PROCLAIM THE DAY SHORTLY.

Various Matters Come up for Consideration at Meeting Last Night.

Preparations for a cleanup day in which the city is to aid and assist the woman's clubs of the city were taken last night at a special meeting of the city council. The city will provide wagons to haul away garbage and the clubs are to superintend the general plan of a spring cleanup. The mayor is to proclaim the exact day later.

At the same time the cleanup day was decided on an ordinance dealing with the education of the public at large to respect the parkings and the curbing was introduced. It will be passed in such a way as to make it a crime punishable by fine to mutilate a parking or curbing and if the ordinance fulfills what was intended for it the administration believes it has gone a long way toward stopping and preventing ruthless disregard for the lawns and parkings, now so rampant in the city.

Cove and Washington avenues will have water mains laid as requested by the taxpayers and residents on these two streets. The committee reported favorably on the petition last night.

An opportunity to save \$300 per carload on pipe used by the city is being investigated and Water Superintendent Hoyt has been sent to Portland to probe the quotation coming from a new firm there that purports to supply pipe at a figure far below what the city is now paying. If the quality of the pipe and the company's facilities are satisfactory, the city will enter into negotiations for its future business with the new company.

The re-assessment of North Second street was commenced last night as a consequence of the decision of the circuit court holding the proceedings invalid on that street.

Council Still Deadlocked.

To all appearances it will be necessary to conduct one or two municipal elections before the city's council can agree on the type of fire trucks to buy. Long since the council agreed to purchase an auto truck and fire fighting equipment, but despite junkets on two different occasions the council seems hopelessly deadlocked on the type to buy. The American-La France machine carried four votes, the Webb one and the Seagrave three last night—this is the way the council has voted on each ballot taken at several meetings, and so far as the public can see, there is no hope of a healing of the breach. Time enough has elapsed since the council investigated the various makes to have a machine on the way to La Grande and the present inadequate fire fighting facilities ready for abandonment.

The lawmakers meet again tonight to consider bonding ordinances.
