Edna Marshall played Lady Diana well. Her voice is not pleasing, but her acting makes up for the flaw in tone.

One of the strong features of the cast is Mr. Bennett and his presentation of the Indian chieftain. The man who knows the Indian in his every mood, would be hard pressed to find a point in which Mr. Bennett fails to correctly portray the majestic tribal ruler accurately.

Allen Longstreet is the bad man, and he hardly appears on the stage before he lets the audience know it. He makes the most of a difficult part and succeeds in showing the bad man as he was and what made the bad man bad.

To neglect a mention of any individual actor in the company is to commit a slight. Every player is good, and that feature makes the company one of the strongest that has appeared in Boise this year.

An audience much smaller than the production deserved witnessed the first night's performance. It is an emotion play throughout and hardly one of those present failed to respond to any one of the sad situations.

ORDINANCE NO. 592, SERIES 1912.

An ordinance prohibiting any person or persons from riding or driving on, over or across any curbing or parking or part strips in the city of La Grande; prescribing the penalty therefor and declaring an emergency.

The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person or persons shall ride or drive any team or vehicle on, over or across any curbing or parking or park-strips in the city

of La Grande, Oregon.

Section 2. Any person convicted before the recorder of the city of La Grande, Oregon, of violation of section one of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 and in default of the payment thereof to be confined in the city jail one day for every \$2.00 of said fine.

Section 3. Inasmuch as acts above prohibited have been committed, thereby destroying the appearance and beauty of the streets of the city and thereby endangering the peace of the city this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the city of La Grande and for that reason an emergency is declared to exist and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval by the mayor, and publication in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer, on and after the 25th day of April, 1912.

Passed the council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, this 24th day of April, 1912, by eight councilmen voting therefor

Approved by the mayor this 25th day of April, 1912.

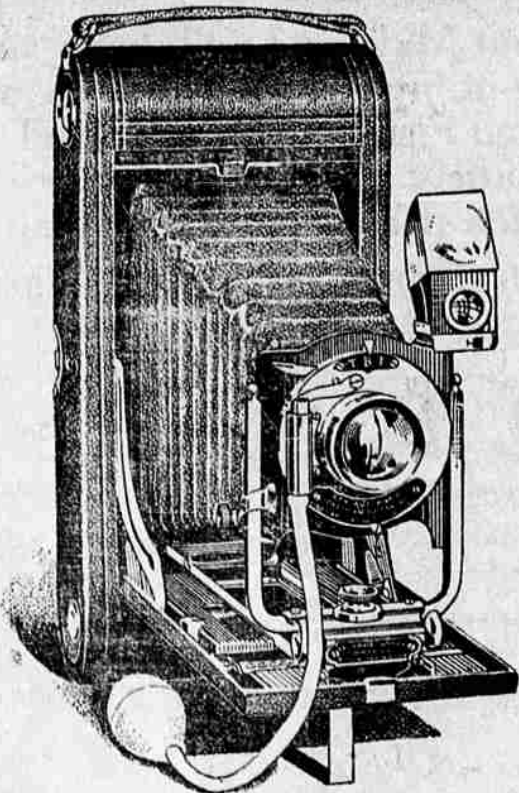
