ENTERPRISE PICKS CANDIDATES

Tickets Selected for Municipal Offices in Enterprise This Week

Candidates for city offices were nominated at a convention held Monday evening in the court house, Enterprise. The election will be held the first week in May, says the Enterprise Record-Chief.

Mayor J. A. Burlleigh called the meeting to order and C. H. Zurcher was chosen clerk. A large crowd was present but there seemed little division of opinion and the following were made candidates.

For mayor—J. A. Burlleigh and G. S. Reavis.
For councilmen, two years—W. R. Holmes, S. D. Keltner, G. M. Gally, and A. M. Wagner.

For recorder—Carl Roe
For treasurer—Arthur M. Pace.
For attorney—A. S. Cooley and Chas. Thomas.

Mr. Burlleigh has not decided whether he will make the race again for mayor. Mr. Reavis expects to remain a candidate.

As for councilmen, there are two to elect, to take the places now filled by Mr. Keltner and Fred S. Ashley. The latter has moved away from Enterprise and is living at Hanford Cal.

There is some uncertainty as to whether the two nominees for city attorney will both consent to run.

After the nominations had been made the meeting discussed the sewer question. Most of those present appeared to be in favor of going ahead on the improvement at once. Cess-pools were condemned as expensive and unhealthy and the need of an adequate drainage system was urged.

Morgan Returns to Wallawa
Enterprise Record-Chief

Thomas Morgan has returned from the Grande Ronde valley where he has been putting in a crop on the land he recently bought there. The farm is near La Grande. It contains 800 acres and Mr. Morgan bought it of J. D. McKennan for \$49,000.

As soon as he had bought the farm Mr. Morgan went to work on it. He put in 400 acres of wheat, oats and barley and some dry land alfalfa. There has been such an abundance of moisture this spring in the Grande Ronde that Mr. Morgan believes a great crop is assured. After he has brought the land into higher cultivation he expects to cut it into smaller farms and sell it.
