CHILLED FANS SEE GAME

RECRUITS PERFORM FOR A CRITICAL AUDIENCE.

Union-La Grande Game Affords a Chance to Look Things Over.

Frisking about in a chilly wind some 14 or 15 seekers after berths in the La Grande club of the Tri-State league yesterday afternoon performed for the edification of a fair-sized bunch of fans when La Grande trimmed the Union club in the Eastern Oregon league, winning 7 to 5. The score was more lopsided than that until Nodine rapped one over the fence that should have been a foul but went as a fair ball, and scored three ahead of him. This was in the eighth inning with a recruit twirling for La Grande who was nervous at the start and filed the bases quickly. "O! Reliable 'Heck'" McInnis finished the game, preventing further scoring.

The men made a fair impression on the critical audience but the weather was so cold that none dared cut loose, especially with pogs, yet the fielding capabilities of the bunch were pretty well paraded. Of the new men out for the mound job, Chandecy and Stamps made the best impression and were perfectly satisfactory to the grand stand. Chandecy has plenty of smoke and good control, and Stamps like him, has a baseball air and action on the field. Both have effective deliveries and Stamps stamped himself as a utility man when he went to first and covered that bag with style and finish, though he is not an infielder. Brown, a catcher, was on first to begin with but lacked the finish to his playing that Stamps had. Hogoboom was on second and not without faults. He muffed up several. J. Chandecy, who, with his brother, arrived from California the morning of the game, electrified the spectators with a splendid scoop-up, but spoiled it with an overthrow, all of which showed him a speedy short and exemplified the necessity of warmer weather in this region for the southerners. None of the new men could throw with any degree of accuracy as they are unused to chilly conditions.

Fitzgerald's fielding on third was all that could be desired of him yet he, too, had no wjug yesterday. Tex is a southpaw pitcher but he sashayed around the left garden in fire-fighting style and pulled down everything that didn't go over the fence. His genial face and basso soliloquies on the coaching line quickly won for him a happy home and he seems to be a jolly good fellow which the fans prefer over a mouthy rag-chewing, wrangling element 899 times out of 1000. Mayer started his career with a La Grande uniform with a home run and hit well throughout the game. As a backstop he is no doubt tip top yet his throwing arm was badly out of kilter yesterday. The club has Owen here now, and with Brown is well supplied with backstops for the present. Owens played right and Proe center, the latter getting several chances in mid-season style in the deep garden.

Of the five men who occupied the mound but three gave much hopes. Taylor lacks the smoke he manipulated so disastrously to batters when he played with Union and Hot Lake seven years ago and Cable was both nervous and lacked control. Either or both of these may develop with the advent of warm weather but at present don't give universal satisfaction like Chandecy, Stamps or McInnis.

Union presented a more balanced lineup than last year, and though Drew, a new man, was hit frequently he has the noodle and the know-how to become a well-provisioned twirler with more workout. The team went home in high spirits because it scored on the Class D aggregation.
