Starts Railroad to Stoddard Mill.

Peter Hogenson of Perry, Oregon, a railroad contractor, arrived in the city last night with 15 men and left today for Whitney where he will start to build a mile and a half of road for the Stoddard Brothers' Lumber company. The road will connect their saw mill with the timber and will be used mainly for hauling logs. Mr. Hogenson expects to put about 25 men on the construction work but cannot as yet estimate the time it will take. The work will be pushed as fast as possible, however.—Baker Herald.

New Service on S. V. Railway.

A new train service and schedule goes into effect on the Sumpter Valley railroad today, whereby the trip to Prairie City from Baker and return may be made the same day, says the Baker Democrat.

Under the new plan, the evening train will leave here at 7 o'clock, arriving at Prairie at 12:25. Returning will leave Prairie at 1:30 p. m., and reach Baker at 6:05. Passengers from Burns and other interior points under the new service can reach Baker the evening of the same day they leave home.

Central Association Starts.

Hannibal, Mo., May 1.—With all the signs pointing to an interesting race for the 1912 pennant, the baseball clubs of the Central association appeared on the diamond today in the initial games of the season. Kewanee played at Monmouth, Galesburg at Burlington, Muscatine at Keokuk and the Ottumwa champions in this city. A season of 130 games will be played, closing Labor day.

Wisconsin-Illinois League.

Rockford, Ill., May 1.—This was the opening day of the season for the Wisconsin-Illinois Baseball league, Oshkosh playing its first game at Madison, Wausau at Aurora, Green Bay at Racine and Appleton at Rockford. The league circuit this year is the same as last, excepting that Wausau has the franchise held last season by Fond du Lac.

Oil Company Wants Leniency.

Jefferson City, Mo., May 1.—The state supreme court today was asked to amend its decree in the case of the Standard Oil company in Indiana and to allow the company to pay a fine of \$50,000, on show the trust connection

Trust Raises Wage Scale.

Glenn Falls, N. Y., May 1.—An increase of wages amounting to 1 cent an hour was put into effect here today by the International Paper company, a so-called paper trust. The advance applies to all employees paid on the hourly basis. It will amount to \$150,000 yearly. The action was voluntary.

Theological Library Dedicated.

Cambridge, Mass., May 1.—Today's celebration of Founder's Day at the Episcopal Theological School was made notable by the dedication of the new library presented to the school by the late John Gordon Wright of Boston. The principal speakers were President Lowell of Harvard University, Bishop Lawrence, a former dean of the school and Professor Bliss Perry.

New Head of Wilson College.

Chambersburg, Pa., May 1.—In the presence of a notable gathering of American educators Dr. Anna J. McKeag, formerly of the Wellesley College faculty, was installed today as president of Wilson College. The principal address at the inauguration exercises was delivered by President Ellen Fitz Pendleton of Wellesley.

Church Deputy Potentate.

Mayor W. J. Church, prominent in local Masonic circles, has been honored with the duties of deputy potentate for this section of Oregon by the supreme head of the Mystic Shriners at Portland. The appointment reached him today.

American Irish Historical Society.

South Bend, Ind., May 1.—Many persons of prominence were in attendance today when the American Irish Historical Society opened its annual convention at the University of Notre Dame. Thomas S. Lee of Providence, R. I., president-general of the society, called the gathering to order and President Cavanaugh of the university welcomed the visitors. The sessions will continue several days.
