OLD MURDER BEFORE COURTS

CRIME COMMITTED FIVE YEARS AGO REVIVED.

Three Men to Be Tried in Oklahoma for Crime Now Long Past.

Poteau, Okla., May 2.—When the Le Flore county district court convenes here next Monday three men will be placed on trial for a murder they are alleged to have committed five years ago. The defendants are Millard Vaught of Mena, Ark.; Will Stiles of Caulksville, Ark., and W. L. Bates, a merchant of Heavener, Okla. They are accused of killing Bud Terry at Heavener, about 20 miles south of here, in August, 1907. Terry was employed at Bates' sawmill near Heavener. In the summer of 1907 he mysteriously disappeared. Some months later the skeleton of a man was found. Terry was a member of a fraternal organization, through whose efforts the body was identified and Bates, Stiles and Vaught arrested and indicted for the alleged murder. The killing is said to have been the result of a quarrel between Terry and the three men.

Educators Confer on Bible Study.

Richmond, Ind., May 2.—Faculty members of many of the leading universities and colleges of the United States assembled at Earlham college today for their annual conference in relation to the students' volunteer Bible study movement. Shailer Matthews, dean of the University of Chicago; Dr. S. C. Mitchell, president of the University of South Carolina; J. R. Mott, president of the World's Christian Student Federation, and a number of other well known educators and religious workers are scheduled as speakers during the two days' session.

UGANDA'S ROYAL SUICIDES.

Kings Who Drank Poison When Sick-ness or Age Threatened.

Some of the curious customs of a pastoral people of Uganda, known as the Banyoro, are told by the Rev. John Roscoe. He said that when once a king was enthroned his person became sacred, and his food was restricted to milk and beef from a sacred herd of cows, which were kept apart from other cows.

The Banyoro monarch never allowed himself to grow old or his faculties to become impaired. When he thought he was going to be seriously ill he called a council, arranged the state affairs with the principal chiefs without giving them any reason for thinking that he was about to die and dismissed them to carry out his instructions.

Then he returned to his private house and summoned his chief wife and ordered her to bring a cup of poison. He drank the contents and in a few minutes was dead. The widow thereupon called one or two of the principal chiefs, who prepared the body for burial. For as long as possible the death was kept secret. Each day the milk and beef were brought to the royal residence, and inquirers were informed that the king was suffering from an indisposition which required him to rest.

In the meantime the chiefs were engaged in making private arrangements to guard the body and protect the sacred herds of cattle during the wars which would follow on the announcement of the death. When the news leaked out the sons of the dead king went among themselves, brother kill brother. The survivor became king and attended his father's funeral.

At the ceremony several of the widows of the deceased king were clubbed to death, as were the common and the cook. Other widows took poison. All the bodies were placed in the grave, the idea being that their ghosts should minister to the ghost of the king in the next world.—London Standard.

BUNCH THEIR WEDDINGS.

Only One Day in the Year for Marriages in Plougastel, Brittany.

In the city of Plougastel, in Brittany, France, all marriages take place on one and the same day. The men are all fishermen, many of them going as far as the Newfoundland banks, and are at home only during a few months in the winter. One day in early February is set apart for the weddings. Little courting is done, but much haggling over the dowry of the girls. They have to bring a certain quantity of linen, chickens, pigs and vegetables. Frequently a match is broken off because the girl's father refuses to add a sack of potatoes to the dowry. On the day set the inhabitants of the entire region go to Plougastel. The whole population goes to church to hear mass, to take communion and to witness the wedding ceremonies. Often fifty or more couples are united on the same day. Bride and groom do not walk together until the ceremony has been completed. For the rest of this and the whole of the next day every home is open to receive guests and to provide food and drink for them. On the evening of the second day the young men carry the dowries of the brides to the houses of the grooms. There they dance and frolic until early morning. And, after they leave, the couple are for the first time together and alone. During the remainder of the year no marriages are concluded. —Lestle's.

OUR WORLD AS A MOON.

Fine Display a Full Earth Would Give to the Selenites.

Were we transported to the planet Venus a peculiar set of views could be obtained of our earth, enabling us to see ourselves, to some extent at least, as others see us. Venus is about the same size as the earth, is somewhat closer to the sun and has more atmosphere than the earth. When the earth and Venus are nearest together they are, of course, on the same side of the sun, and in consequence of this the earth does not see more than a very small part of Venus illuminated, but Venus, on the other hand, sees all of one side of the earth illuminated and is therefore able to claim she has something that takes the place of a moon, for the earth to Venus at this time looks very large and bright, almost as much so as our moon does to us.

If we could see all the illuminated surface of Venus on these occasions we should have quite a distinct second moon. When we do see all of her illuminated surface she is on the opposite side of the sun from us and consequently at an enormous distance, yet she is so brilliant as to prevent us from seeing her surface distinctly.

But to our own moon we appear in the best light as a moon. A full earth as seen from the moon, according to Todd and other astronomers, is a very inspiring sight. It can at once be seen why this is necessarily true. The earth is several times larger than the moon and would appear in the heavens as a disk about fourteen times the size of the moon. It would probably shine with a variable light, due to the shifting clouds of the earth, though the light is, of course, reflected from the sun, and the reflection is due in part to the upper surfaces of the clouds.

The outlines of the continents of the earth appear very clearly to the moon as if they were formed in paper mache on a globe. Cities of comparatively large size could be made out with ease in case observers were there to make them out. The intensity of the reflected earth light would be as much as fourteen moons and would enable the Selenites, if such there were, to read or work in comparative daylight. —Harper's Weekly.

PRESERVE FOR BIRDS FORMED

ELGIN PEOPLE OWN LAND IN BIG TRACT

Three Thousand Acre Preserve Is Set Aside for Game Birds at Elgin.

Three thousand acres tributary to Elgin has been set aside as the Elgin Game preserve, and propagation of game birds is the chief aim before the game wardens who are interested. Chas. B. Oral, deputy game warden for this county yesterday announced definitely what the plan consists of. A similar preserve is to be set aside near Cove for the same purpose and it is readily seen that much good will accrue from them when they are attaining the results intended. AID TO FORESTS.

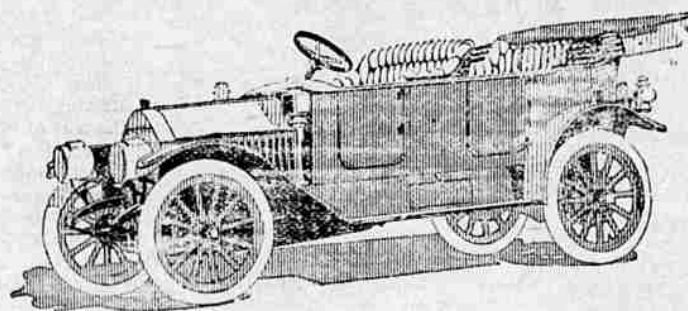
