

HUMPHREYS HANGED JUNE 12

SENTENCE PRONOUNCED AT CORVALLIS TODAY

NEITHER HAVE ANYTHING TO SAY AGAINST JUDGMENT

Men Who Are Found Guilty of Killing Mrs. Griffiths Hear Their Doom Today With Hanging Heads—Neither Will Say Anything to Court—Will Appeal the Case to a Higher Court—Believe They Will Not Hang.

Corvallis, May 3.—George and Charles Humphreys who were convicted two days ago of the brutal murder of Mrs. Eliza Griffith, were today sentenced to be hung at the state penitentiary on June 14, by Judge Hamilton.

When the prisoners were brought into court, Attorney Jeffrey, for the defense, made a motion for a new trial, but it was denied.

George Humphreys was ordered to stand up and receive sentence. He was asked if he had anything to say in his behalf and with bowed head and in a low voice he said, "No." Sentence was then pronounced, Judge Hamilton saying the crime was "one of the most atrocious and heinous crimes ever committed in the state of Oregon." Charles Humphreys was then sentenced. Neither showed particular emotion, though both were pale. The brothers believe they will not be hanged. They have been told so. Attorneys will take an appeal to the supreme court.

SORROWING FATHER SUICIDES

Prefers Death to Separation From His Wayward Son in the West.

Philadelphia, May 3.—Preferring death to separation from his son who is held in the reformatory at Sacramento, Cal., on a charge of killing another youth, William Kerran, aged 45, and financial secretary of the Philadelphia Union Steam Engineers committed suicide here by the gas route. Near his body was found a letter from Judge Hughes of the Sacramento juvenile court saying he was unable to pardon young Kerran because of his conduct in being responsible for the death of another boy named Huber.

BRITISH INQUIRY ON.

Seafarers' Union Gets Recognition at the British Investigation.

London, May 3.—When the British court of inquiry resume today the investigation of the Titanic wreck, Lord Mersey presiding, granted the demand of the Seafarers' union for a representation at the hearing. Attorney General Isaacs then formally opened the case, presenting the known facts to the court. The first witness was Archie Jewell, lookout on the Titanic who testified he saw no icebergs up to 10 o'clock the night of the disaster, when he was relieved.

Winthrop College Jubilee.

Rock Hill, S. C., May 3.—The Winthrop Training school, founded twenty-five years ago in a little one-room building in Columbia and since grown to be one of the foremost institutions of the country for the training of women teachers, today celebrated its silver jubilee with an all-day program of exercises in which many visiting educators took part. A leading feature of the program was the laying of the cornerstone for the new building soon to be added to the school.

First Hydro-Aeroplane Meet.

New York, May 3.—A program of nine interesting competitions has been prepared for the hydro-aeroplane meet to be held on the Hudson river tomorrow under the auspices of the Aero Club of America. The meet is attracting wide attention as it will be the first of its kind ever held in America. One of the most interesting features of the program will be a mail carrying contest from 138th street to Governors Island and return. The other events will include bomb-dropping on warships and other craft, starting and racing away from the water, weight lifting from water in the cypress at time, accurate landing on a given line and capture of toy balloons.

BUILD FENCE ABOUT PARK

IMMEDIATE CONSTRUCTION OF A BARRICADE IS NEEDED.

OPPOSITION APPEARS

J. T. Williamson Objects to Construction of Ball Park-Fair Grounds.

Construction of a fence about the entire Union County Fair association grounds in East La Grande was placed in the hands of a committee to act last night at the initial meeting of the board of directors of that association. The fence is to be built for the coming series of baseball games, and until the new grand stand is constructed at a point nearer the railroad track than the old one, the present structure will be used. The fence insures protection for all concerned.

Track Committee in Action. The committee announced a sub-committee to officiate in the capacity of obtaining plans and specifications for a race track suited for horse, auto and man, and as soon as it reports back, the bids will be advertised for. A similar committee is considering the grand stand figures and costs and data for that building will be obtained at once so that construction can proceed. A large membership of the committee was present to transact business.

OPPOSITION DEVELOPED.

J. T. Williamson Entering Opposition to Ball Park There.

Asserting that the construction of a fair grounds so near his property would reduce the value of his property 50 per cent, J. T. Williamson has announced his determination to oppose the construction of the park at every turn. He maintains the general plan would interfere with his personal privileges and hopes to frustrate the building of the institution through legal channels.

SUFFRAGETTE PARADE READY

NEW YORK TO SEE SPECTACULAR PARADE TOMORROW.

Troop of Cavalry One of Features as Tomorrow's Showing.

New York, May 3.—The women identified with the suffrage movement in this city are in a flutter of excitement over the great suffrage parade which is scheduled to take place here tomorrow. For many weeks the great event had been planned and a great amount of work had to be done to put everything in proper shape and to arrange every detail, so as to avoid everything that might be construed into confusion. The organizers of the parade were in honor bound to prove to the world that they knew how to arrange a parade as well as men could do it.

There was a parade last year, but there were only about 3,000 men and women in line. Tomorrow, however, it is expected that fully twenty-five thousand suffrage sympathizers will take part. The parade was planned by the Woman's Political Union of New York City and it was decided to make it as grand and cosmopolitan in character as it could be made. The appeals of the organizing committee to various organizations of men and women favoring women's suffrage met with gratifying responses and it is pointed out as a significant fact that delegations of women from ten or twelve states will take part in the parade.

One of the most interesting and sensational features of the parade will be a troop of suffrage cavalry, consisting of a number of young society women in riding breeches, riding coats and three-cornered hats, mounted astride on their horses which troop will form the head of the parade and lead the procession down Fifth Avenue. Miss Annie Tinker, a noted horse woman and suffragette will command the cavalry. The other participants in the parade will march. There will be more uniformity in the

ROOSEVELT AND TAFT TOURING MARYLAND PRECINCTS

LA FOLLETES BOOSTS OVER INTERESTS IN SOUTH

Six-Year Term for President With No Re-Election Coming up for Consideration in Both Houses Soon, Say Politicians at Washington—Candidates Are to Rest After Next Sunday.

Washington, May 3.—A flying trip through Maryland is the next step of President Taft's campaign, according to an announcement made at the white house today. Taft will leave on the trip tomorrow speaking at Havre, De Grace and Aberdeen and will return here tomorrow night. Sunday Taft starts for Cincinnati for a short rest.

La Follette's Campaign Spreads. Tehama, Cal., May 3.—With a speech in Tehama this morning and others in Willows, Yolo and Woodland this afternoon and evening, R. M. La Follette today completes his stumping tour of northern California. From now on he will confine his campaign to the Sacramento, Stockton and Napa districts, taking in the southern and central coast sections of the state. The final address will be in San Francisco the night before the primary election.

Roosevelt "On the Jump." Salisbury, Md., May 3.—Roosevelt's campaign of Maryland's delegation to the republican national convention, opened here today before a large enthusiastic crowd. In addition to the address here, Roosevelt spoke to a big gathering at Havre, De Grace, Perryville and Delmar, and is scheduled to speak tonight in Baltimore. He will return to New York Sunday.

Act on Six-Year Term Soon. Washington, May 3.—Prediction that early consideration of the resolutions urging six-year terms for president of the United States and prohibiting re-election would be had in both houses of congress, is voiced here today. Senator Works of California says opinion is divided as to the merits of the proposition. Senators Bourne of Oregon and Bristow of Kansas are opposed to the measure.

LONE ROBBER AT TACOMA IS BOLD

ATTEMPTS ROBBERY OF BANK IN DAY-LIGHT

GRABS FOR ROLL OF BILLS ON PAYING DESK

One Hundred Men Pursue and Capture Man Who Dares to Attempt a Daylight Robbery of Tacoma Bank This Morning—Carried Piece of Wood to Frighten the Bank Officials.

Tacoma, May 3.—An attempted robbery of the National Bank of Commerce here today by Tom O'Malley, unarmed, threw Pacific avenue into an uproar.

O'Malley walked up to the paying teller, A. M. Frazer, and stuck his hand into his pocket threateningly, and said:

"You know what I want." Before Frazer could answer, Mike Morris, a contractor, stepped up, unfolding a wad of bills.

O'Malley made a grab for it, and Morris started after him, joined by 100 men.

O'Malley was seized by H. F. Alexander, a local steamship man, and, with the help of others he was overpowered.

O'Malley carried a stick of wood in his pocket to frighten the men. He is now in jail.

Chico's Fiesta Arborea.

Chico, Cal., May 3.—The three-day carnival known as Fiesta Arborea, which opened here today, has attracted thousands of visitors to Chico and the hotels are crowded. The city is handsomely decorated and presents an attractive holiday appearance. The program of the festivities includes a civic parade and a grand historical pageant, in which more than 2,000 boys and girls from the high, normal and grammar schools will take part.

Missouri A. C. Marathon.

St. Louis, Mo., May 3.—The fact that the winner will have a good chance of representing America in the Olympic games at Stockholm this summer has served to increase public interest in the annual marathon run of the Missouri Athletic club, which is to take place tomorrow. The entry list is the largest in the history of the event. The contest will take place over the usual 25 mile course, starting at Freeburg, Ill., and finishing at the clubhouse of the Missouri A. C. in this city.

Other Strikers Exiled.

Hogquiam, Wn., May 3.—The abduction of W. A. Thorn and C. A. Biscay, leaders of the Industrial Workers of the World, who were run out of Hogquiam and beaten up Wednesday night was followed by the driving out of Emil Silve, a Finnish strike leader, and two others by the special deputies. The city is in a ferment of indignation today. Warrants have been issued for the kidnappers of Thorn and Biscay. Prosecutor Campbell says he will prosecute them vigorously.

Door's Requisition Ordered.

Sacramento, Cal., May 3.—Requisition papers for the removal of W. M. Door, alias Willis A. Dow, from Stockton, to Lynn, Mass., where he is charged with the murder of George Marsh, the millionaire manufacturer, has been granted by Frank Griffiths, executive secretary to Governor Johnson. Officers Burckes of Lynn started at once for Stockton to secure the prisoner.

Allen Trial Near End.

Wytheville, Va., May 3.—Indications are that the state's case against Floyd Allen, a member of the Allen clan of bandits, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting in Hillsville county court house, will probably be concluded during the day. The defense will then begin.

More Levees Break.

Bayou Sara, May 3.—The levee here broke at noon and water is pouring through a 100-foot gap and is spreading rapidly in all directions. Already most of the streets are inundated. All male residents are fighting desperately to prevent further breaks.

Negro Couple Incinerated.

San Jose, Cal., May 3.—Mr. and Mrs. Robert Porter, aged negroes, were burned to death in their home here today.

GOLDEN RULE BROKEN INTO

UNKNOWN QUANTITY OF VALUABLES TAKEN AWAY

CLEVERNESS EVIDENT

Difficulty Met in Obtaining Entrance From Rear Windows.

Goods of an unknown quantity, were removed from the Golden Rule store last night some time by burglars. Entrance was gained after great difficulty for the robbers had tried all the windows in the rear of the building and found them so securely latched that entrance was next to impossible. By clever tricks of the burglary game the men eventually forced one of the windows and went over the store. How much is taken is unknown. With keen attention to details the men probably went over many departments taking such goods as suited their purpose best. In no one place was there any marks left to determine how much was missing.

Though the trail of their strenuous efforts to gain admittance is still there nothing that might lead to detection of the men's identity has been found.

LOCKE FOR BISHOP.

Methodists From the Coast Are Working for Westerner.

Minneapolis, May 3.—Interest of the Pacific coast delegates to the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church centered today in the probable choice of C. E. Locke of Los Angeles as bishop. Speculation as to how many bishops will be chosen overshadowed all other matters before the conference.

For some time there has been a feeling that more bishops were necessary to the church. It is thought the number will be increased by two or three. There are now eight bishops. Quiet electioneering is in evidence today and Locke has a large following.

TYPE UNIONS JOIN STRIKERS

CHICAGO AFTERNOON DAILIES AGAIN HAMPERED.

Though International Officers Won't Sanction Strike Unions Walk Out

Chicago, May 3.—With the aid of non-union workers, all Chicago morning newspapers appeared today, despite the general strike of the union web pressmen. The situation is further complicated, however, by the action of the union wagon drivers, refusing to deliver the papers turned out by the non-union pressmen.

Whether Chicago printers will join the striking pressmen will be determined today at a meeting. Although the officers of the International Typographical union say they will not sanction a strike because the union has an ironclad contract with the newspapers, the local union is seriously considering quitting work anyway.

More than 250 police guarded the offices of the newspapers today and the non-union men were also protected.

Judge Burke today enjoined the striking wagon drivers from interfering with the strikebreakers driving the newspaper wagons but at several places where non-union drivers stopped, the strikers destroyed numerous bundles of papers.

Efforts of the Chicago newspapers to get out papers today is further hampered by the action of the Typographical Union members in quitting work. Members were ordered out pending a conference of publishers and printers. Up to noon, none of the papers affiliated with the Publishers association, had gotten out the early editions, the pressmen having tied up the plants completely.

Indian Drummers at Muncie.

Muncie, Ind., May 3.—Traveling salesmen representing practically all section of the state, and many of them accompanied by their wives and daughters, are gathered here to attend the annual state convention of the Travelers' Protective association, which opened here today and will come to a close tomorrow night. CONFEDERATES IN LAST CAMP

ON TO RECEIVE COLOES OF THE GRAY UNIFORM

OF ITS KIND PROVES ELABORATE AFFAIR

Up to Reign in Macon Next Week When Confederate Veterans Assemble for the Last Reunion of the Old Gray Boys—Kindred Organizations Are Also to Meet There.

Macon, Ga., May 3.—Fifty thousand visitors are expected in Macon next week for the annual national reunion of the United Confederate Veterans. Realizing that, by the very force of nature, they will probably never again have the opportunity to entertain the soldiers of the "lost cause," the citizens of Macon are bending every effort to make the approaching gathering an event long to be remembered. Never in the history of the city have such elaborate preparations been made for the reception and entertainment of people from abroad as are being made for this occasion.

Today the work of decorating the city was begun in earnest. By Monday morning the downtown section will be a mass of flags and bunting. The Confederate colors naturally will predominate, but the national colors will be liberally intertwined with the emblems of "the storm-cradled nation that fell." The survivors of the mighty legions of Lee and Jackson, and the valorous followers of Forrest, Hill, Johnston and others too numerous to mention will be enthused by the pictures of their leaders—the leaders who won imperishable fame on many a hard-fought field.

The reunion of this year will be the twenty-second annual session, and will be presided over by Lieut. Gen. C. Irvine Walker of Charleston, S. C., the commander-in-chief. Tuesday and Wednesday will be devoted to the business of the organization, and Thursday the parade of the old guard in gray will take place. The parade will be the climax of the celebration. Because of the advanced age of a great majority of the marchers the route will be short. The old soldiers will be given the most conspicuous place in the line. The sponsors will ride in automobiles and carriages.

The commander-in-chief and his staff, the Governor of Georgia and his staff and many distinguished visitors will review the parade from a grandstand at the intersection of Third and Cherry streets. In numerous cities and towns within a radius of 100 miles the public schools will give a holiday and hundreds of school children will come to Macon to witness what they may never have a chance to see again—the veterans who are left of the armies of Virginia and Tennessee, led by Lee, Jackson, Johnston and Mood, the old flag, the old uniform and to hear "Dixie" and the old Confederate yell for the last time.

The old veterans will be the recipients of every attention during their stay in Macon. Food in abundance and healthful lodgings are gratuitously awaiting those who come and properly register. Thousands will find accommodations in the great tented city that is being erected in Macon City Park, where many of the Sons of the Confederates Veterans will also be quartered. Scores of homes will be thrown open for the accommodation and entertainment of the ladies who will attend the reunion. The general executive committee, having in charge all arrangements, announce that no extortionate fees will be exacted from visitors by the hotels and boarding houses.
