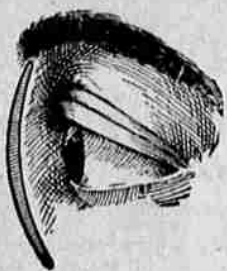

PUBLICISTS NOW AT WORK

GEORGE SCOLLARD COMMENCES A CAMPAIGN

Will Convince Buyers That La Grande Is a Suitable Community.

Advertising La Grande, her resources, her scenery, her merits as a place to live in will be the mission of C. G. Scollard and his corps of publicists assigned from this date on. Thus was given out last evening from the Security Land and Trust company where Mr. Scollard was busily engaged in getting things together for a publicity campaign for La Grande and the valley.

ORDINANCE NO. 600, SERIES 1912.

An ordinance vacating all that portion of North Pine street from the north line of Q avenue to the south line of T avenue, and North Cherry street from the north line of Q avenue to the south line of T avenue and North Balm street from the north line of the right of way of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, Elgin branch line to the south line of T avenue and R and S avenues from the east line of North Maple street easterly to the city limits.

Whereas, Union County Fair Association, (a private corporation), is the owner of blocks 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 17, 18 and that portion of block 19 of Williamson's addition to the city of La Grande, lying north of Elgin branch railroad, and propose to use said blocks as fair grounds and athletic park.

Now, therefore, The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That all that portion of North Pine street from the north line of Q avenue to the south line of T avenue, and all that portion of North Cherry street from the north line of Q avenue to the south line of T avenue, and all that portion of North Balm street from the north line of the right of way of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, Elgin branch, to south line of T avenue, and all that portion of R avenue from the east line of North Maple street easterly to the city limits, and all that portion of S avenue from the east line of North Maple street easterly to the city limits, be and the same is hereby vacated, and the city of La Grande hereby waives any further right, title or interest in or to the portions of said street above described.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 599, SERIES 1912.

An ordinance providing for and regulating the trimming of trees, to prevent interference with electric light, power, telephone and telegraph wires in the city of La Grande, Oregon, prescribing a penalty for the violation thereof, and declaring an emergency.

The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That in all cases where any electric light, power, telephone or telegraph wires, lawfully placed, owned, operated and maintained by any person, company, firm or corporation having lawful authority or franchise to operate the same, shall come in contact or be interfered with, by any limbs or branches of any shade, ornamental or other trees in the said city of La Grande, Oregon, it shall be the duty of the owner of such trees to permit such trees to be trimmed and pruned so as to not interfere or come in contact with any of such wires, and that the owners and operators of such wires shall have the right, subject to the provisions of this ordinance to do such pruning or trimming as may be necessary to avoid danger of contact or interference with such wires; provided, however, that in doing such trimming or pruning, care must be exercised and no unnecessary danger must be done to any of such trees; provided further that in any case where the owner or operator of any such wires shall not obtain from the owner of such trees, a permit to so trim or prune the same, such trimming or pruning shall in

such cases not be done except upon permit granted thereto, by the chairman of the committee on streets, or by the council of the city of La Grande, and that such trimming shall in all cases be under the supervision and according to the directions of the chairman of the street committee, or the city council.

Section 2. That in all cases where permit to trim or prune any trees or trees has been granted, as provided in section 1 of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, in any manner to interfere therewith, provided such trimming or pruning is carefully done and no unnecessary damage occurs to such trees.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, before the recorder of the city of La Grande, Oregon, be punished by a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars, nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, for each offense, and in case of failure or refusal to pay such fine, such person may be imprisoned in the city jail for the period of one day for each two (\$2.00) dollars of such fine.

Section 4. Inasmuch as the limbs of trees are growing fast in the city of La Grande, and are likely to come in contact with electric light or power wires; a constant danger exists, and this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the health and safety of the inhabitants of the city, and an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage by the council, approval by the mayor and publication in one issue in the La Grande Evening Observer.

Passed the council of the city of La Grande, this 1st day of May, 1912.
