ELABORATE ENTERTAINMENT FOR THEM ASSURED

Automobile Caravans, Luncheons, Dinners and Sightseeing Schedule.

When Ray Nye, the Fremont, Neb., millionaire, brings his galaxy of 23 wealthy bankers representing millions on millions of capital to La Grande about the 20th of this month, the entire area of Grande Ronde valley will be traversed by a caravan of automobiles. Local parties have made arrangements for not only taking the band of wealth representatives to Union, Hot Lake and Co., but they will be taken out to the new irrigation works and view the running waters through the newly-constructed canal. The special car carrying the bankers will arrive in the morning and the forenoon is to be spent in sightseeing. The luncheon hour will be spent here probably and in the afternoon the millaires will be run to various sections of the valley, back again for dinner in this city when the visitors will again be guests of local people.

The visit of Ray Nye, who is the supreme head of the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company means much to Baker and Union counties as they will make but two stops in this state, Baker and La Grande. One day is to be spent in each city. Picking out safe investment territory is the prime motive of the tour.

OFFICERS AFTER SUSPECT.

ATTORNEY GEN. VISITS CITY

WATER LITIGATION BRINGS HIM HERE.

Government Objects to Amount of Water Assigned to Asylum.

Litigation growing out of government objections to the number of inches of water assigned to the state insane asylum near Pendleton, brought Attorney General A. M. Crawford of Salem to La Grande. He is attending the May term of the supreme court but he is here today conferring with Water Superintendent Geo. T. Cochran relative to the water situation in Umatilla county. Parties who owned the land prior to the purchase by the state for asylum purposes, laid claim to about 2 1/2 inches of Umatilla water. The government has objected to this amount, conceding the state's right to about one-half inch and the attorney general is here looking up data on the situation. Superintendent Cochran will take testimony in this case and many others at Pendleton next Monday.

Attorney General Crawford returns to Pendleton tonight to further represent the state in the supreme court session wherein Wallawa bootlegging cases are the chief matters under consideration. The West-Mutual Life Insurance case is one of the principal matters before that court from this county.
