PIPPINS TAKE LOOSE CONTEST

McINNIS IS ABLE TO REPEAT AT BOISE.

Sunday Game Goes to Boise, Giving Irrigators the Series.

Boise, May 12.—(Special)—La Grande stopped her losing streak momentarily Saturday afternoon and allowed a majority of the Pippins to fatten their batting averages when, after having pulled up alongside the railroaders, Kellackey's men blew up in the tenth inning yesterday and allowed five runs to slip over the pan. In their own part of the final session the Irrigators were helpless, and they lost the first extended inning contest of the Tri-State league, 13 to 8. Both teams played the game with boots on, but the errors of the home club seemed the more costly. In spite of the ragged work of both on the defensive, it was a game crowded with excitement, and the result was always in doubt until that explosion in the tenth.

Crutchfield, the big red haired boy from Albion, worked on the slab for Boise, and though he got away badly the first inning, he pitched a good game and deserved to win it. He had speed, curves, and fairly good control, but he has a lot to learn before he can be called a finished pitcher. He had trouble trying to field his position.

McInnis again did the turn, he won the opening game and came back on his next time at the slab, thus far doing something no other pitcher has done, winning the first two games pitched. The story of Saturday's game is well told in the box score:

SEATTLE MAN LIKES LA GRANDE

WRITES ABOUT HIS IMPRESSIONS IN LA GRANDE.

Cells Prospects for Former Building Year Here Remarkable.

That La Grande is attracting the favorable attention of outside investors and intending residents, is more apparent this spring than ever before. The resources of the fertile Grande Ronde Valley and the many advantages of La Grande are being put before outside people in the right way. On Tuesday of last week Martin Malone of Seattle accompanied by Gill Utter, a salesman in the Seattle office of the La Grande Development company, arrived in La Grande and were met at the station by Frank Phy and other local representatives of the company. The party entered automobiles and were driven down over the Conordale Addition and then around the city, being shown the new building operations in progress and the preparations under way for improving the many streets that are to be improved this year. Particular attention was called to the new garages that are being constructed and to the fact that the automobile agencies have already sold \$50,000 worth of cars in this city this spring. After a thorough inspection of the city the visitors were taken for a trip around the northern end of the Grande Ronde Valley. The commercial orchards of Fruitdale, and Imbler were inspected and the Seattle men pronounced them to be the finest they had ever seen. The party ended their trip by a visit to Hot Lake, where they sampled the famous batias and had dinner, returning to La Grande by automobile in the evening.

Mr. Malone expressed himself as very much surprised at the size and appearance of La Grande. Before leaving he said: "My trip here has been a revelation to me. The Grande Ronde valley and the city of La Grande exceeded my greatest expectations. The only thing lacking to make of this country and this city the most prosperous and attractive section of the Northwest is proper advertising and publicity. I am going back to Seattle a "booster" for La Grande and the Grande Ronde valley."

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon on the 3rd day of April, 1912, creating improvement district No. 55 and designating Washington Avenue as such district and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council on the 17th day of April, 1912, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Washington Avenue in said improvement district as hereinafter described by laying thereon Gravel Bitulithic pavement, 28 feet in width, with full street intersections and constructing cement curbs, and constructing drainage, the Council will ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Washington Avenue from the east line of Fir Street to the west line of Twelfth Street, and the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:
