EIGHT BISHOPS CERTAIN.

Committee Recommends Action of the Methodists in Bishop Question.

Minneapolis, May 14.—The committee on Episcopacy of the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church reported to the conference here today with a recommendation of new episcopal residences at Helena, Los Angeles, Kansas City, Detroit, Pittsburgh, and Rome, Italy. This means eight new bishops as there are two bishoprics, New York and St. Louis now vacant on account of deaths.

TAFT AUDIENCE FEATURE

MISS CARLOTTE JONES GUARANTEED TO TREATS.

Visit to King of Bancrofters and to the White House Part of Features.

An audience with President Taft and a pleasant half day with the famous sage, Elbert Hubbard, of East Aurora, where the king of Bancrofters has his shop, are two of the many features that will fall to the lot of Miss Charlotte Jones, daughter of Councilman and Mrs. W. R. Jones, in June when she tours the states with a party of Oregon girls under the supervision and at the expense of the Pacific Northwest magazine. Philip S. Bates writes two interesting letters to Miss Jones bearing on this subject. One says:

"Today's mail brings me the information that President Taft has arranged to receive you in the east room at 2:45 p. m. Friday, June 14th.

"This honor is very deeply appreciated and the opportunity one I believe you will look forward to with great pleasure."

The next letter says:

"You have no doubt heard of Elbert Hubbard, publisher of the *Fra* and the *Philistine* at East Aurora, N. Y. The first party that went east visited Mr. Hubbard and spent one of most enjoyable days with him while away. I met him this morning at the train and during breakfast he suggested that we again visit East Aurora. I told him that my time was limited as I had set aside but half a day for Buffalo, and half a day for Niagara Falls, with luncheon at the Shredded Wheat Biscuit factory. He stated that the girls would be tired after a week's travel on the train and that he would meet me in Buffalo with automobiles, take us out to East Aurora, which is a 17 mile drive through one of the finest sections in New York, and give us dinner and bring us back in time to reach the train for New York City. I therefore accepted the invitation. I want to assure you now that this will be one of the most enjoyable features of our trip."

Los Angeles, May 14.—Emma Goldman, the anarchist, left here today for San Diego where she will throw herself into the fight being waged there by the Industrial Workers of the World for "free speech." She was escorted to the train by 50 admirers but refused to state if she would take an active part in the campaign or not, but said she would be on hand to "render any possible aid."

General Duncan Dead.

San Antonio, Tex., May 14.—Brigadier Gen. Joseph Duncan, commanding the department of Texas, died today of heart failure after an illness of several days here. General Duncan participated in the Indian campaigns and also in the Spanish war, serving in Cuba and in the Philippines. He was breveted on three occasions for gallantry.

Bryan Movement Starts.

Burlington, Ia., May 14.—The plans to "stampede" the state democratic convention which meets here tomorrow for W. J. Bryan were completed here today by the Bryan league of Iowa. It is said that three-fourths of the delegates favor Bryan. Adherents of Clark and Wilson, however, ignore the Bryan movement.

Harmon Answers Bryan.

Cleveland, May 14.—Issuing a general denial of the charges that he is a reactionary and particularly accusing W. J. Bryan that he repudiated the initiative referendum pledges, Governor Harmon passed today in active campaign for his candidacy for the democratic presidential nomination.
