Fine May Be Tacked on Bradley.

Rumor has it that Bradley, man-
ager of the La Grande team, laid
himself liable to a fine when he used
Tamp Osborne in Sunday's game says
Frank Greene in the Boise Statesman.
Osborne is said to have been under
suspension in organized baseball.

It appears that Osborne was sus-
pended by the Union association last
year, and that before he started in
Sunday's game here he wired Lucas,
the president of that organization, to
know whether or not the suspension
still held good.

It is said that Lucas immediately
got busy with Secretary Farrell of
the National association. Either
through Lucas or from himself di-
rect, Farrell is said to have sent no-
tice to Bradley that Osborne is
ineligible. The notice is claimed to
have been delayed.

If, on investigation, it should be
proven that Bradley knew Osborne
was under suspension, Secretary Far-
rell might plaster a fine on him.
Since Bradley had taken his team
home before the story got out, noth-
ing further could be learned last eve-
ning.

Osborne was suspended from or-
ganized baseball last year while a
member of the Missoula club in the
"union" league. At that time it was
claimed that while under the influ-
ence of liquor he started a fight with
a newspaper man and used a knife in
the argument. The president of the
league was notified of the episode. It
was carried up to the higher courts
of baseball, and Osborne was black-
listed.

So far as could be learned here, he
has never been reinstated.

Texas Firemen's Convention.

First Formal Session to Be Held at
at Four This Afternoon.

Bishops, clergy and laymen coming
from a great area of Eastern Oregon,
are congregating in La Grande today
for the annual convocation of the
Eastern Oregon jurisdiction. Informal
conference at Honan hall and an in-
formal meeting of the clergy in the
church constitute the chief activities
today for the convocation proper does
not commence until tomorrow. One
address this afternoon at 4 o'clock is
arranged for and the first formality
of the two-day sessions commences
with that event.

Each train, commencing with last
night, brought its share of lay and
clergy delegates. Bishop Paddock,

DARROW'S CASE NEARS

against Darrow. It is also believed
that Mrs. Orlie E. McManigal and De-
fective Guy Biddinger, both of Chi-
cago, will be called as witnesses by
the state.

The maximum penalty defined for
bribery is ten years in prison. For
corruptly influencing one drawn as
a juror five years and a fine of \$5,000
is provided by the law. Should Dar-
row be found guilty on all of the
four counts of the charge, 30 years
imprisonment and \$10,000 fine might
be imposed. It is not considered like-
ly, however, that the maximum pen-
alty would be inflicted, even if the
state should succeed in clearly prov-
ing its case against Darrow. The lat-
ter denies his guilt and his friends
are hopeful that he will succeed in
completely clearing himself.

Suicide's Body Found.

Olympia, Wn., May 14.—The dead
body of John Thornbloom was found
today within a mile of the farm where
he attempted to assault his former
wife, Mrs. Anna Thomas, Sunday. Af-
ter she beat him off, he shot her in
the jaw. She will recover. In flee-
ing, Thornbloom put a bullet through
his brain.
