There was a general confusion—running with buckets and what not—and, to make matters worse, the fire was becoming dangerous, as it was rapidly extending to the powder magazine.

During the hubbub Lord Nelson was in the chief cabin writing dispatches. His lordship heard the noise—he could not do otherwise—and so in a loud voice he called out:

"What's all that noise about?" The boatswain answered: "My lord, the loblolly boy's set fire to an empty bottle and it's set fire to the ship."

"Oh!" said Nelson. "That's all, is it? I thought the enemy had boarded us and taken us all prisoners. You and loblolly must put it out and take care we're not blown up. But pray make as little noise about it as you can or I can't go on with my dispatches." And with these words Nelson went to his desk and continued his writing with the greatest coolness.

THE PARIS OF PERSIA.

Teheran is One of the Dream Cities of the Orient.

According to a Persian proverb, "Isfahan is beautiful, Shiraz is lovely, but Teheran is most beautiful of all." The Persians call Teheran the "Paris of Persia." This city lies on a sandy level. There are gentle hills to the north, and far in the distance one may see a range of mountains crowned by a majestic and snow covered peak.

The features of Teheran that attract the traveler's attention first are its city walls and its hundred towers that stand at intervals in the wide circle of the ramparts. In the center of the town is the great square of the arsenal, where an enormous number of now obsolete arms are stored. The great Boulevard des Ambassadeurs, as the French would call it, which is near the arsenal, is one of the finest to be found outside Paris.

If this part of the town has a modern aspect the southern part of the city has retained its oriental character, and here palaces, bazaars and mosques jostle one another, surrounded by narrow, winding, mysterious streets. Teheran is one of the dream cities of the east.—London Family Herald.

Ministerial Perquisites.

Admission to West Point.

A candidate for the Military academy at West Point must first get the indorsement of the senator or congressman from his district. The question of appointment is generally settled in each district by competitive examination, the representative in congress appointing the boy who obtains the highest marks. Once the candidate has passed this competitive examination and received the appointment to the academy he must pass both a mental and physical examination at the hands of the army officers assigned to duty at the West Point institution. All appointees must be between seventeen and twenty-two years old, free from any infirmity which might render them unfit for military service and be able to pass an examination in English grammar, English composition, English literature, algebra through quadratic equations, plane geometry, descriptive geography and the elements of physical geography, United States history and the outlines of general history.

Ingenious Old Jars.

From time to time fresh illustrations are afforded as to the ancients' ingenuity, with special reference to what are termed the "lost arts."

Recently it has been shown that the old Peruvians must have understood the laws of atmospheric pressure in order to construct the curious jars and vases they left. One of these pieces of pottery was ornamented with the figures of two monkeys, and when water was poured into or out of the vessel sounds like the screeching of monkeys were heard. Another similar vessel has the figure of a bird that uttered appropriate notes; another was ornamented with a cat that mewed and another with snakes that hissed. An ingenious water jar bore the form of an aged woman on whose cheeks tears were seen to trickle, while sobs were heard when water was poured from the jar.—New York Tribune.

Famous Venetian Palace.

Vendramin is not only one of the most beautiful residences on the canal in Venice, but it is closely associated with the history of the city of the dogs. It was built in 1441. German princes occupied it at first. Then it passed into the possession of the Duke of Mantua, who purchased it for 50,000 ducats of gold. It was the scene of great social events under the Archduke Charles Ferdinand of Austria and his wife, Anne de Medici, in 1652, and through them the palace has come into the possession of the present owners through marriage. It was here that Richard Wagner died in 1883. The desk at which he wrote "Tristan und Isolde" is carefully preserved. Some years ago a plaque was affixed to the palace showing its connection with the great composer.—London Globe.

Dies After Fluding His New Home.

Baker, May 14.—(Special) — Mr. Newell, about 65 years old, died this morning at his home four miles this side of Medical Springs with hemorrhage of the brain which resulted in paralytic paralysis. He became sick last Friday and had been in a stupefied state since. He and his family moved to Baker about a year ago from Oklahoma and had lived here until about three weeks ago when they moved to their present home. Mr. Newell is survived by a wife and a son. Arrangements for burial have not been made but will probably be at Medical Springs.

Date of Congress Left to L.D. Mahone.

L. D. Mahone left this morning in company with W. J. Hughes, a member of the board of directors of the state mining congress, for Prairie City. He expects to be in that place for several days during which time he will inspect their properties, says the Baker Herald.

Upon his return he will go directly to Portland and from there will write to Governor West concerning the date of the convention of the governors in Boise, Idaho. The date will probably determine that of the mining congress of Baker. Mr. Mahone was empowered last night by Messrs. T. C. Burke and James Howard, the mining committee of this city who were to have set the date with him to settle the matter as he saw best.
