Artist and Courtier Too.

LEGAL SEALS IN JAPAN.
 Every Person Must Have One Which the Government Registers.
 Japanese seals (han) are of wood, stone or metal, with signs engraved on the face. They are used in addition to a signature to represent an individual, a legal person or a corporation. The seals of the emperor are distinguished as privy and state seals. They are each three inches square.
 The state seal is used mostly upon documents relating to foreign countries. The privy seals are stamped on imperial rescripts, issued for proclamations at home.
 Japanese law requires that each individual should send in an impression of his seal as a specimen (called Jitsu-in) to have it registered and kept in a government office (district office of a city, town or village) that it may represent himself in a deed.
 The material employed to make these seals consists of various kinds of precious stones, gold, silver, etc. Those mostly in use at the present day are of agate, rock crystal, ivory, rhinoceros or buffalo horn, shell, marbles or of cherry wood or boxwood, and recently india rubber has come in use.
 The ink used for stamping is called niku. It is generally of vermilion red. The cheapest kind of seals are made of boxwood and sold at 5 cents apiece. Most seals are oval in shape, but some are round and others square. They rarely exceed one-half inch in diameter.—Oriental Review.

PEROXIDE'S MANY USES.
 It is a Valuable Antiseptic and Can Be Employed in Other Ways.
 One of the most powerful bleaching agents employed in various trades is peroxide of hydrogen, also known as hydrogen dioxide and oxygenated water. The natural color in ostrich plumes is removed by it, and it will also bleach a great number of other things, such as bones, ivory, silver, wood, silk, cotton and hair. It can be used to restore the color to old oil paintings which have become darkened by age.
 Peroxide is a valuable antiseptic and will also destroy objectionable microorganisms in water. It can even be used to cure indigestion, but for this purpose as well as for other medicinal uses it must be diluted. A drop of pure peroxide is strong enough to raise a white blister on the skin.
 Minute quantities of peroxide of hydrogen are found in the air, in rain water and in snow, and it is sometimes found in the juices of certain plants. The liquid is produced on a large scale by the action of acids on peroxide of sodium. The solution may be concentrated by allowing the water to freeze out, by passing dry air through it or by evaporation in a vacuum over sulphuric acid.—New York Sun.

Brother Jonathan.
 The origin of the term "Brother Jonathan" was as follows: When General Washington went to Massachusetts to organize the army he found a great lack of ammunition and of other necessary means for the conduct of the war, and at one time it seemed quite impossible to arrange things properly. Jonathan Trumbull was then governor of the state of Connecticut, and the general, who placed complete reliance on his excellency's judgment, said, "We must consult Brother Jonathan." He did so, with the satisfactory result that the governor was successful in supplying many of the pressing wants of the army, and thenceforth, whenever difficulties arose and the army spread over the country, "We must consult Brother Jonathan" became a common saying until it passed into a nickname for the whole country.

A Kingdom For a Horse.
 The king of England owes his crown to a horse's shoe. The act of settlement by which in 1701 parliament elected the house of Hanover to the British throne, passed the commons by only one majority. This deciding vote was given by Sir Arthur Owen, M. P. for Pembrokehire, third of his title, who rode post haste from Wales for the purpose. He had relays of fresh horses all along the route, but arrived, dusty and travel worn, at Westminster barely in time to the very minute. Had one of his horses gone lame or cast a shoe he would have been too late.
