Honan Hall Rooms to Be Ready for Occupancy Early Next Week.

Public library interest has been whetted by the arrival in La Grande of the librarian who is to enact the difficult task of placing the nucleus for the Carnegie library on its working basis. She is Miss M. L. Cowell of Ashburnham, Mass., and commencing early next week will take charge of the library proper. Rooms in Honan hall will be ready for the books and the librarian about Monday.

A greater portion of the library books have been received, and President Loughlin today announced that the balance will arrive shortly. Honan hall is rapidly being equipped with the proper shelving so that definite arrangement of the books and periodicals can commence about Monday. In Miss Cowell La Grande unquestionably has a skilled librarian. A graduate of Mount Holyoke, connected with various big libraries, including the engineering library at New York, Princeton library and Pittsburg institutions. She came here direct from Pittsburg.

FRUITMEN TO MEET.

Big Delegation of Fruit Growers to Assemble at Imbler

The annual meeting of the Eastern Oregon Fruit Growers' Union will be held at Imbler tomorrow. Delegates will come from all the local organizations such as Union, Cove, La Grande and Imbler, for the organization is formed for the purpose of handling the output from this valley in a more consistent and effective manner than has been the rule. Automobiles will convey the delegates who may arrive on tomorrow morning's train in La Grande to Imbler, and La Grande delegates will be likewise taken care of in the transportation line. A general inspection tour will follow, terminating with a banquet at Imbler at noon. In the afternoon the business sessions will be held at which the delegates will again be returned to La Grande.
