IVANHOE HOUSE RUINED BY FIRE

STRUCTURE COMPLETELY RUIN-
ED THIS MORNING.

Much of the Furniture Also Destroyed
by Blaze at 9 O'Clock.

Fire originating probably from a
defective flue completely destroyed
the Ivanhoe residence near the gravel
pit on Eighth street this morning.
Some furniture belonging to Mr.
C. Holbrook was removed but
the greater amount was consumed by
the blaze. The fire had considerable
headway before the occupants of the
house discovered it and by the time
the department had reached there, au-
tomobiles carrying volunteers had
brought men enough to the scene to
get some of the goods out before the
hose cart came bumping down the
rough side streets. Little insurance
covers the household furniture and
Mrs. Ivanhoe is not in the city to
throw light on the amount of in-
surance carried on the dwelling.

Holbrook is a printer employed by
the Quick Print.

This morning's "brilliant" run of
the fire department is held as a cri-
terion of what inadequate fire fight-
ing apparatus does. The Ivanhoe
building is only a few blocks from
the heart of town, yet it was burning,
every room afire, when the depart-
ment got there. A few of the fastest
sprinters of the volunteers got to the
house in fairly good-time but the
more corpulent ones came panting
along in a few minutes. Then, all
at, they jerked the cart out on the
street and waited for a wagon. Even-
tually one came around the corner,
was wig-wagged to the scene, the cart
carried on, the crowd piled in, and off
they went. But the house was burn-
ing down and another dwelling scorched
and might have been burned up,
for all the department could have
done and the members did the best
they could with the facilities.

"The incident may not be a very
costly one but it pictures just what
will happen with the city without fire
apparatus," said a spectator to the
whole affair today.
