

COMMISSIONER FLAYS SAN DIEGO

VIGILANTES AND I. W. W. CROWD ARE BLAMED.

HEAVY FINES AGAINST

CITIZENS ARE URGED

Governor Johnson's Representative Military Forces to Take Charge of Affairs at San Diego—Bitter in Denunciation of Both Factions Involved in Troubles There.

Sacramento, Cal., May 18.—Stinging denunciation of the campaign of the Industrial Workers of the World at San Diego and even more stinging denunciation of the "vigilantes" of that city whom he convicts of un-American uncivilized abuse of the San Diego disturbers with recommendation that the state authorities take a drastic hand in the war there, are features of a report on the San Diego situation sent to Governor Johnson by Harris Weinstein, appointed as a commissioner to investigate the San Diego labor war.

Weinstein scores District Attorney Uley of San Diego county for indifference of the reign of lawlessness, and practically recommends that all the San Diego "vigilantes" should be fined \$5,000 each, and sent to prison for not more than ten years and be subject to the forfeiture of all the privileges of American citizens.

Emma Goldman Angry.

San Francisco, May 18.—Emma Goldman, the anarchist, and her manager, Dr. Ben Reiter, who was tarred and feathered, were out of San Francisco today.

Miss Goldman, bitter against the San Diego women who were in the party which met her when she arrived at San Diego, demanding that she leave the city. She said some of these women cried: "Tear her clothes off! Let us get at her!"

Citizens Arrested.

San Diego, May 18.—Attorneys Fred Moore, Marcus W. Robbins, who have represented the I. W. W.'s in practically all their cases here appeared before Superior Judges Gay and Sloan today and asked warrants for contempt of court for 15 citizens because they alleged the citizens surrounded them at the police station and told them in no uncertain terms to leave town. The judges asked for affidavits, and they were furnished. Arrests are expected to follow.

The citation to show cause why they should not be adjudged in contempt of court for threatening officers of the court will be issued for 160 local citizens Monday. Superior Judge Sloan this afternoon, declared the evidence as presented by Attorney Robbins and Moore, who were, they alleged threatened if they did not leave town, was sufficient to justify this action.

WIFE SHOT BY ANGRY HUSBAND

WHEN POLICE PURSUE HE ATTEMPTS SUICIDE.

Ontario Resident Gives Chase to Police When He Murders Wife.

Hamilton, Ont., May 18.—Frank Buckle, a resident of Brantford near here, shot and instantly killed his wife, aged 24. The police in an automobile pursued the slayer for several blocks when he was finally cornered. Buckle shot himself in the leg, but will probably recover. He was in a fit of anger when he shot his wife.

IS ON NEW SITE NOW

WASHINGTON CITY DWELLING PLACE REPAIRED.

Californians in Capital City Devote Attention to Poet's Dwelling.

Washington, D. C., May 18.—With elaborate exercises the cabin which was the dwelling place of Joaquin Miller, the poet of the Sierras, during that part of his life spent in the national capital, will be formally dedicated tomorrow afternoon. The cabin has recently been removed from its original site on Sixteenth street northwest to Rock Creek park, where a permanent location has been provided for it. The dedication will be conducted by the California State association.

BISHOP VOTE IS CLOSE.

Chicago Man Lacks but 50 in Having Sufficient to Elect.

Minneapolis, May 18.—The third ballot on bishops in the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church today resulted in no election. Dr. W. O. Shepperd of Chicago received 486 votes falling 50 short of the 536 necessary to elect. Rev. Matt S. Hughes of California receives 562 votes.

Racing Begins at Woodbine.

Toronto, Can., May 18.—The spring meeting of the Ontario Jockey club opened this afternoon at Woodbine park, and the prospects are for one of the very best race meetings ever held in Ontario. The meeting will continue through next week, with seven races daily on the card. A new race among the feature events will be that for the Connaught Challenge cup, presented by his royal highness, the Duke of Connaught, for three year olds and upwards, the bona fide property of Canadian owners resident in Canada. A steeplechase will be run on each day of the meeting, \$7,000 being given for cross-country events. The officials in charge of the meeting are Joseph J. Burke, presiding judge; Francis Nelson, associate judge; Albert S. Dade, stater and Fred Gerhardt, clerk of the scales.

German Catholics of Illinois.

Freeport, May 18.—Hundreds of delegates and other visitors are here for the annual convention of the German Catholic societies of Illinois. The gathering will be opened tomorrow morning with a pontifical high mass celebrated by Bishop Muldoon of Rockford. A parade and sacred concert will be the principal features of the afternoon and evening program. The business sessions will occupy Monday and Tuesday.

Dallas, Tex., May 18.—Arriving trains brought hundreds of visitors to Dallas today for the 8th annual convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of America, which will be opened tomorrow with lay sermons in the local churches by well known advertising men. Every section of the United States and Canada will be represented at the convention, which is expected to be the largest ever held by the organization.

3 CANDIDATES WORK IN OHIO

ROOSEVELT GIVES HIS REASON FOR DOUBT ABOUT OUTCOME.

PRESIDENT TAFT RESTS OVER SUNDAY WITH BROTHER

La Follette Becomes Factor in Ohio Politics by Making His Personal Appearance There "Blind Ballot" Held by Roosevelt to Be One Cause for Alarm in Ohio's Elections.

Delaware, O., May 18.—Speaking from the rear platform of his train here today, Roosevelt said: "There is only one feature in the Ohio situation which makes me doubtful of the outcome—that is the blind ballot. My name will not appear on the ballot. The Taft people would not permit it to be put there, not wanting you to have a chance to vote for me."

Columbus, O., May 18.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt left Columbus this morning to carry out today's itinerary which calls for 11 speeches in as many cities and towns. He speaks tonight at Cleveland and will close his Ohio campaign Monday.

La Follette Takes a Hand.

Bowling Green, May 18.—La Follette left for Columbus today where tonight he will continue the fight against Taft and Roosevelt for a portion of Ohio's delegates to the Chicago convention.

Taft Visits Brother.

Toledo, O., May 18.—President Taft left Toledo today for Cincinnati where he will pass Sunday with his brother, Charles P. Taft.

CRUCIAL HOUR IN WAR HERE

TWO MEXICAN FORCES ALIGN THIS AFTERNOON.

Terrific Struggle Under Way at Ceballos This Afternoon.

Mexico City, Mex., May 18.—With the life of the Mexican revolution at stake the rebel forces under General Orozco this afternoon engaged with the federal forces under General Huerta in a terrific struggle near Ceballos. Meagre reports of the clash received before the federal troops cut the telegraph wires say the battle was raging furiously. The two commanders fully realize that the fate of Mexico hangs on the outcome.

LARGEST SHIP LEAVES WAYS

DREADNAUGHT SLIPS TO WAVES AMID CHEERING

COST OF SHIP IS OVER FOURTEEN MILLIONS DOLLARS

Texas Ranch Represented at Formalities by Daughter of Prominent Republican—Ship Has Enormous Tonnage and Is Sister to the New York—Crowds Cheer

Newport News, May 18.—Greeted by a chorus of steam whistles and cheered on by an enthusiastic assemblage of 20,000 spectators the 27,000 ton battleship Texas, twin sister of the New York, building at the Brooklyn navy yard, gilded from her ways today at the yards of the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock company.

As the big vessel swept down to meet the water of the James river Miss Claudia Lyon, daughter of Col. Cecil Lyon, a wealthy ranch owner and republican national committeeman for Texas, broke the traditional bottle of champagne and formally named the ship. Grouped about the sponsor on the official stand were numerous representatives of the state of Texas, together with Secretary Meyer and a number of other officials of the navy department and high officers of the navy.

The Texas is designed to be the largest and most formidable warship afloat. Her displacement is nearly four times as great as the old battleship of the same name. Her total cost will be in the neighborhood of \$14,000,000. She will be the first warship of the American navy to carry a battery of 14-inch guns. Her contract calls for a speed of at least 21 knots an hour.
