and securing uniform rules and regulations in the use of said streets, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared, that this ordinance shall go into effect immediately after its passage, approval by the Mayor and publication in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer, on and after the 20th day of May, 1912.

Passed the Council this 15th day of May, 1912, by eight councilmen voting therefor.

Approved by the Mayor this 10th day of May, 1912.
