

MRS. PANKHURST SENT TO JAIL

MILITANT LEADER TO SERVE 8 MONTHS IN PRISON.

SOCIETY OUT TO HEAR VERDICT REACHED TODAY

Jury Recommends Leniency and the "Hard Work" Clause Is Dropped From Sentence Given by Presiding Judge—Cost of Trial Is Charged up to the Three Defendants.

London, May 22.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragettes in England, Rethwick Lawrence and his wife, sympathizers of the cause, were found guilty here today of conspiracy to destroy property. Mrs. Pankhurst and the Lawrences were each sentenced to nine months' imprisonment without hard labor.

The court room was jammed when Attorney General Isaacs started his arguments against Mrs. Pankhurst. The two Lawrences and the suffragette leader persisted in interrupting the speaker and kept the courtroom in continual uproar. The attorney general asserted that before starting on the window smashing campaign the suffragettes withdrew their funds from the banks here, known as their acts were unlawful and the law was liable to seizure.

Jury Has Tender Verdict

The jury in announcing its verdict, recommended leniency. The court assessed the costs of the case against the defendants for the government introduced documents and papers seized in a raid on the office of the suffragettes to show that window smashing was a recognized part of the general campaign to force the authorities to grant women suffrage.

The three defendants all collapsed when the verdict was brought in. Mrs. Pankhurst appealed to the court to make her offense a political and not a criminal one. She seemed greatly weakened. With voice choking the once malicious suffragette leader tearfully defended her action. "My health is broken as a result of the authorities keeping me in a cold damp cell while serving my recent sentence," said Mrs. Pankhurst, "and the law have not had a fair trial."

COMMENCEMENT TOMORROW.

Good Program Provided for Friends of School Graduates.

Americans Fear Complications.

Abens, Tex., May 22.—With a battle between Mexican rebels and government troops across the international boundary line from here, the United States government has taken by the United States government to day to protect American lives and property, with the intent of preventing flight by either side into American territory. Colonel Steele, commanding the department of Texas, today sent a detachment of troops to follow the line of battle along the border.

FAVORED SON SWAMPED BY COLONEL ROOSEVELT IN OHIO PRIMARIES

Columbus, O., May 22.—While returns from the Ohio primaries' districts do not give direct Roosevelt-Taft figures for the reason that their names do not appear on the ballot, every indication at noon is that Col. Roosevelt has carried enough districts to give him control of the state convention, June 3rd. Roosevelt's manager, Walter Brown, declared that Taft will have only 10 delegates out of the 42 Ohio district delegates—Taft managers claim as high as 14.

On the democratic side 1851 out of 5163 precincts in Ohio give Harmon 43,755, Wilson 34,175. La Follette did not elect a delegate though he ran ahead of Taft in the 20th district which includes Cleveland. From the present indications it appears certain that Roosevelt has at least 31 delegates and probably 32.

The Roosevelt men assert that the colonel will have a total of 38 delegates, including the six to be named at the state convention here.

Harmon delegates have been elected in the first, second, fifth 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th and 18th districts. Wilson apparently carried the others except the sixth and seventh where the result is in doubt.

Walter Brown, manager for the Roosevelt Ohio campaign, said today: "Roosevelt will be nominated on the ballot. Every evidence shows that Taft is impossible. The dark horse talk is ridiculous. No other reactionary will be acceptable to the people who rejected Taft. The nominee will be progressive and Roosevelt will have enough votes to nominate him without a single vote from New Jersey or South Dakota."

Laylin, Taft's campaign manager, contends that Taft has at least 10 and probably 14 delegates. He refused to discuss the report that Taft will withdraw as a result of the Ohio primary. It is reported that if Taft withdraws his adherents will back Root for the presidential nomination. "Contest Settled"—Roosevelt.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., May 22.—"The result in Ohio settles the contest," was the statement made here today by Roosevelt when he was assured that all the Roosevelt delegates in Ohio except ten had been elected.

"The victory in Ohio," continued Roosevelt, "shows it will be hopeless to try to beat us in Chicago by unseating our delegates who represent the will of the people of Washington, Indiana, Kentucky, and other states. Nor will it be possible for the opponents to win by seating delegates elected by fraud in the southern states. I appreciate what the people of Ohio did. It represents a victory not only for the plain republicans but for every good citizen for in this contest we stood for fundamental rights of good citizenship."

Roosevelt was showered with congratulatory telegrams and will begin his New Jersey campaign tomorrow.

Taft Back at White House.

Washington, May 22.—President Taft arrived here from Ohio and went directly to the white house. He will take a rest preparatory to the opening of his New Jersey campaign.

"Call Taft Off"—Dixon.

Washington, May 22.—"It is a crime for Taft to continue in the contest," was the statement today of Senator Dixon, campaign manager for Roosevelt. "Friends of the president," continued Dixon, "should not permit him to go to New Jersey. He said in Cleveland last Thursday that the vote in Ohio would decide the nomination question. The republican party is bigger than the ambition of anyone."

The Taft bureau here this afternoon conceded Roosevelt 38 delegates out of Ohio's 48 delegates. The Roosevelt managers assert that Taft has only eight delegates, declaring the other two are still doubtful.

SNAKE RIVER LINE PROMISE

That the survey down the Snake river from Huntington is not for the purpose of abandoning overland trains across the Blue mountains but for a new road from Los Angeles to Spokane is the text of a Los Angeles dispatch printed in the Boise Statesman this morning. It says of the Snake River grade:

An entirely new railroad line from Los Angeles to Spokane, tapping a country heretofore untouched by steam transportation service and opening up a wealth of resources in Idaho, is the plan of the Harriman system, which includes the Southern Pacific, Central Pacific, the Oregon Short Line and the Northwestern line.

That the final surveys for the route have been completed by the engineering department of the Southern Pacific was announced today. Immediately

construction will commence and within three years trains will be running over the new road.

Route of Proposed Line.

From Los Angeles to Mojave the present main line of the Southern Pacific will be used and from Mojave to Owenyo, in Inyo county, a new line will be constructed along the route of the Los Angeles aqueduct. From Owenyo to Tonopah Junction the old California & Colorado railroad, a narrow gauge line owned by the Southern Pacific company, will be standardized at an expense of thousands of dollars, and a short extension will take the line to Haven Nev., on the main line of the Central Pacific.

Winnemucca to Nampa.

From Hazen to Winnemucca, Nev., the main line of the Central Pacific will be followed, and from there a new line will be constructed to Nampa, Ida. On the main line of the Oregon Short Line the rails of this road will be used to Huntington, Ore., and from there to Homestead, Ida., the Northwestern tracks. From Homestead the surveyors have run a line along the Snake river and north to Spokane, the northern terminus of the new route.
