GRAND STAND PLANS READY

CONSTRUCTION IS TO COMMENCE
FRIDAY.

Boxes, Roomy and Numerous and the
Seating Capacity Convenient.

Plans and specifications for the new
grand stand at the athletic grounds
were completed last night and have
met with the approval of the directors
and all who have seen them. The
structure will seat 2,000 very com-
fortably and for the present there
will be no bleachers. The individual
seat has a back rest, a foot rest and
a space for spectators to pass in
front of each row of seats.

Boxes Are Roomy.

A row of six commodious boxes, ad-
jacent to the front wall are provided
for and between the boxes and the
first tier of seats are sufficient pas-
sageways to commodiously handle any
crowd. The main entrance opens in
the center of the seating space and
exits, sufficient in number, are pro-
vided for. Every detail that goes to
make a complete and up to date grand
stand are provided for.

The bids will be let Thursday night
and from then on it will be a hur-
ry-up job to get the place in readiness.
Nothing better will be found in
Eastern Oregon once the structure is
completed.

UNION COUNTY DELEGATE RE-
CEIVES HONORS. ISLAND CITY ORGANIZATION LOSE
MEMBER

Wealthy Donor to Willamette Remem-
bered by Conference.

Vice President Dr. E. H. Todd of
Willamette university, who is a dele-
gate to the quadrennial conference of
the Methodist church, telegraphs to
Oregon friends of "Uncle Abe" Eaton
that the conference signally honored
the birthday anniversary of Mr. Eaton
at Minneapolis. Mr. Todd says in his
dispatch:

The 78th birthday of A. E. Eaton, of
Union, Ore., a delegate, was recog-
nized by the general conference in
the form of a vote expressing appre-
ciation of his gift of a \$50,000 build-
ing to Willamette university and oth-
er services to the church, which resolu-
tion was presented by Dr. Homan,
Coast Man Galus.

Dr. Benjamin Young is gaining in
the voting for bishop. Fletcher Homan
drew out of the race just before
the ballot taken at 5 o'clock. The
report was spread by the friends of
both candidates. The result of this
ballot was read at 2 o'clock, show-
ing Dr. Young to have 135, a gain of
11 votes. Now that there is but one
candidate in the northwest, there is
a better chance of success. This un-
ion of forces and sympathy is cry-
stallizing into interest where apathy
has been before. The votes for all
diminishing.
