

REBEL DEFEAT HURRIES PEACE

**PRESIDENT MADERO IS
HOPEFUL AFTER A
HARD SCARE**

**VERY DECISIVE DEFEAT
ADMINISTERED YESTERDAY**

**Situation in Mexico Borders on Peace
Since Federal Leaders Overwhelm
and Decisively Lick Rebels' Main
Army — New Rebel Leaders Crop
Out and Are Taken to Prison.**

Mexico City, May 24.—Jubilant over dispatches from Rellano telling him of a great victory there, President Madero today predicted an early end of the revolution. He said: "My soldiers know my gratitude is greater than words can express. I look forward to peace in Mexico soon."

A message from the rebel front near Corralitos, dated May 23 (9 p. m.) says:

Again Orozco's army of rebels retreated before the deadly artillery fire of General Huerta, the federal commander. As at Canejos a week ago, the rebels were unable to withstand the hail of shells poured into their ranks and retired north from Rellano.

For nearly 24 hours the two main forces of the government and rebel troops in northern Mexico were engaged in fierce conflict. The loss could not be ascertained, but casualties are numerous on both sides. Even in the darkness the federals persisted in their artillery fire. Orozco commanded his men in person and was a great inspiration to his own troops. It was a day of maneuvering that called for the best in the commanders of both side, while the pounding of field guns and the deadly fire of machine guns tested the stamina of the rank and file of both armies.

The federal opened the attack. The rebels were slow to reply but the rifle men concealed in cuts and the trenches poured into the advancing infantry thousands of bullets. The federal officers once attempted a flank movement but a stinging fire from the rebel infantry and dismounted cavalry finally compelled the abandonment of this maneuver.

New Rebels Discovered.

Nogales, Ariz., May 24.—F. Gonzales, a member of the Sonora state congress and Lieut. Col. Reyrea, a former commandant of the federal garrison at Nogales, and three others where names are not revealed, were taken to the penitentiary at Hermosillo to await further investigation of an alleged plot to seize a dozen of the larger cities in northern Sonora, for the rebels. The men are alleged to be leaders in the plot.

Askan Roads Dictated to.

Washington, May 24.—Notification to Alaskan railroads that they must comply with the interstate commerce law regulations were sent out from here today by the interstate commerce commission. The regulations provide that a schedule of rate must be filed before Aug. 1, and the railroads are also expected to comply with safety applications and hours of service regulations.

Travelers of Two States.

Hutchinson, Kas., May 24.—An army of knights of the grip invaded Hutchinson today and will remain in possession of the city until Sunday. They are the delegates to the annual grand council meeting of the United Commercial Travelers of Kansas and Oklahoma, which held its opening session this morning in Odd Fellows' hall. Following the customary exchange of greetings the grand council went into executive session. The business proceedings will conclude tomorrow morning and in the afternoon the annual convention parade will be held.

PITNEY SHOCKS COLLEAGUES

**NEW JUSTICE NOT IN HARMONY
WITH FASHION.**

FAN LAW IS BROKEN

**High Hat and Prince Albert Also in
Discard With Pitney.**

Washington, May 24.—Democratic simplicity, instead of "highfalutin" judicial dignity, is winning Washington for Mahlon Pitney, the new associate justice of the supreme court. He is becoming favorably known for his unassuming and democratic conduct—more resembling the plain people than an exalted bearer of judicial ermine.

Justice Pitney is also shattering the time honored customs of the supreme court. One "body blow" at the supreme court precedents was his early introduction of a palm leaf fan for personal comfort during a hot spell. Another peculiarity of the "new" justice is that he keeps awake during long arguments of attorneys. He has earned accolades of several attorneys for his close attention in following their arguments. Furthermore, he eschews silk hats and Prince Albert raiment, preferring the modest business suit.

Justice Pitney recently afforded the house a new sensation by mingling with the members. Supreme court justices are rare visitors to the house or the house. But Justice Pitney is not because of his former service as a member of the body. When opportunity arises, he mixes with old friends among the representatives.

AMERICAN INTERVENTION IN CUBA APPEARS NECESSARY

GOMEZ IS CONFIDENT.

Washington, D. C., May 24.—President Gomez today notified the state department that he has 2,000 troops in Oriente province, ordered to crush the rebellion at any cost. It was stated at the state department that the United States would not interfere, unless it was imperative.

Havana, May 24.—American intervention in Cuba is believed certain here today, following receipt of dispatches from the province of Santiago and from towns along the route of the Bayamo railroad telling of raids by negroes.

The situation is acute, and it is generally believed that the government will be unable to control the situation without help from the United States. The rebels are running things with a high hand along the

line of the Bayamo railroad looting hundreds of homes and mistreating women and children.

More Land for Settlers.

North Yakima, May 24.—Tomorrow there will be an exceptional opportunity to procure a choice irrigated farm on the Yakima irrigation project a short distance west of this place. On that day the Tieton unit of the project, comprising 41 farms of 20 to 80 acres each, will be opened to entry for homesteaders under the homestead and reclamation laws. Each settler will receive the land for years. He must in addition assume the filing fee and for living on it five his share of the cost of constructing the reclamation dams and canals, \$93 an acre and of the cost of maintenance, at present \$1.50 an acre per year. Up to date the United reclamation service has spent nearly \$6,000,000 on the Yakima irrigation project and expects to spend about \$3,000,000 more.

NEGRO ORDER OF ELKS ILLEGAL RULES HIGH NEW-YORK COURT

Albany, N. Y., May 24.—The state circuit court of appeals here decided today that the negroes have no right to the title, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, a fraternal organization, composed exclusively of white men.

Although Presiding Judge Bartlett decided the negroes are not entitled

to use the name of the organization, he ruled that they might have the same titles for their officers that the white Elks have, adding:

"If the negroes want to use the name of an animal, there is a long list of beasts, birds and fishes yet unappropriated."

POTENTATES BURY LATE KING

Copenhagen, May 24.—Impressive funeral services were held here today for the late King Frederick VIII of Denmark who died at Hamburg. The body was buried at Roskilde in Frederick's chapel.

Two thousand European notables including four kings and four queens attended the funeral. King Frederick's body was placed in a crypt where rest the bodies of 33 Danish kings.

Copenhagen, May 24.—The new king, Christian X, now reigns over Denmark. His accession has been hailed with all appropriate enthusiasm and ceremony, though sorrow for the death of Frederick VIII, is still the predominant sentiment.

BUDAPEST QUIT BY COMPROMISE

**GENERAL SUFFRAGE
FOR MEN GRANTED,
WOMEN DENIED**

**LOOTING AND WRECKING
OF FACTORIES KEEPS UP**

**Military Forces Have Situation Well
in Hand This Afternoon and Scenes
Enacted Yesterday Are Confined to
a Smaller Scale—Women Continue
Warfare to Get Suffrage, Too.**

Budapest, May 24.—Rioting which yesterday convulsed the city as a result of the government's defeat of universal suffrage, is today being continued—though not so fiercely. The lull is caused by a partial surrender of Count Tizza and his party, conceding manhood suffrage, as demanded. The women are still demanding the ballot and it may cause further trouble.

Factory owners tried today to lock out their employees whereupon the men of trades raided most of the shops, breaking up machinery and looting at will. Several clashes with the police occurred and more than a score of persons were wounded, although there were no fatalities.

The military practically controlled the situation this afternoon and comparative quiet was maintained throughout the city.

The troops will remain until normal conditions are restored; the woman suffrage issue is undecided tonight.

13TH JUROR IS HARD TO FIND

**DARROW TRIAL DRAGS BECAUSE
OF DIFFICULTY.**

All Jurors Available Have Been Bor-

rowed to No Purpose.
Los Angeles, May 24.—No progress was made at the forenoon session of the trial of Clarence Darrow, charged with the bribery of a juror in the recent McNamara case. After the third panel was exhausted, all veniremen possible were borrowed from other departments of the court and it was found necessary at ten o'clock to adjourn until 2 p. m. in order to summon more veniremen.

**MORNING SPEECHES
NOT REPEATED IN
AFTERNOON.**

**NEW JERSEY SEETHS WITH
INTENSE POLITICAL HEAT**

**In Sharp Contrast to Ohio Campaign,
President Taft Suddenly Becomes
Dopey and Converses With Thou-**

sands Rather Than Address Them—Two Other Candidates Also Active.
Phillipsburg, N. J., May 24.—Speaking listlessly, in sharp contrast to his belligerent attitude in Ohio, President Taft this afternoon addressed 1,000 persons here. Evidently he is wearied of the strife with Roosevelt and spoke in a conversational tone, but refrained from attacks on the former president, as he did in his morning speeches.

All Candidate Active.
Trenton, N. J., May 24.—With President Taft, Colonel Roosevelt and Senator La Follette stumping the state New Jersey is today seeing an exciting campaign.

La Follette made seven speeches during the day. Taft left Trenton at 8 o'clock this morning and is scheduled for a dozen speeches. In his early addresses he roasted Roosevelt to a turn, paying little attention to La Follette. Roosevelt speaks at three meetings today, and is billed to make an address here tonight.

Stone Attacks Roosevelt.
Washington, May 24.—Senator Stone of Missouri roundly roasted Roosevelt in the senate. He read an editorial from a Virginia paper criticizing the colonel's attacks on Lormer, "because he accepted \$100,000 from the lumber trust when Roosevelt was accepting a larger sum from the steel, harvester and other combines."

Oklahoma Editors Meet.

Muskogee, Okla., May 24.—Makers of Oklahoma newspapers rounded up here in force today for the 21st annual meeting of the State Press Association. An invocation by Bishop Thurston opened the proceedings this morning. Other features of the forenoon-program were addresses of welcome by Mayor Miller and President Spaulding of the Muskogee Commercial club. A response for the visitors was made by John Golob of Guthrie and the annual address of Horace Sheppard, of Altus, president of the association, was read. The afternoon session was given over to a cost congress.

STRIKE HURTS FOOD SUPPLY

**FOODSTUFFS ROT AS TRANSPORTERS
STRIKE.**

**Situation Is Critical Though No Riots
Take Place.**

London, May 24.—With thousands of tons of freight and foodstuffs rotting on the docks and wharfs, the port of London is completely tied up today as a result of the transport workers strike. The board of trade is attempting to settle the grievances of 150,000 dockers, carmen, lightermen, laborers and others connected with the docks.

The master lightermen are all affected. The unions were represented at the board's inquiry. Order prevails everywhere.
