DEATH OF 500 BLAMED TO HIM RAYNOR POURS FORTH ORATORY

SENATE INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT ELOQUENCY FLOWS UNHAMPERED OVER SEA DISASTER.

J. BRUCE ISMAY ESCAPES WITH NO MENTION AT ALL MARYLAND'S ELOQUENT ORATOR URGES REFORMATION

(Chairman Flays White Star Line, and Wireless Operator Who Sold News of the Disaster—Radical Legislation Asked for in Brilliantly-Worded Report to the Senate.

Washington, May 28.—The sooner we awaken to a realizing sense of our responsibility, the better it will be for the elevation of the country—we are going mad with the lust of wealth and of power and ambition. May the heart rending scenes upon the night of anguish and woe on which the Titanic sank give us faith and lead us to the altars of our fathers." Thus did Senator Raynor, of Maryland, eloquently sum up the sermon he preached to the senate this afternoon on the Titanic disaster. The Maryland senator, one of the most forceful speakers in the upper house, swayed the audience with his burning oratory. "What this nation needs are some severe lessons that will strengthen the pillars and the altars of its faith," he declared. "We are to a great extent today defying the ordinances of God. We are separating society into castes, with fabulous fortunes upon the one side and destitution and poverty upon the other. It takes a terrible warning to bring us back to our moorings and our senses. If this disaster teaches no lesson or points no moral, then let us pass it by with stoical indifference until the next disaster and in the meantime let the carnival go on. But may the heart rending scenes upon that night of anguish and woe give us faith and lead us back to the altars of our forefathers."

Senator Raynor pictured in eloquent phrases the agony of separations on the ship and explained that he knew one passenger and his wife that died—the wife refusing to leave her husband. He told of the "rallying cry for the living and the dying." The strains of "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

"As the sea closed upon the heroic dead," he concluded, "let us feel that the heavens opened to the lives that were prepared to enter."

Demands of Railroad Clerks. Boston, Mass., May 28.—The 15,000 clerks employed by the Eastern railroads are demanding the establishment of the eight-hour workday, a wage minimum of \$2.25, time and a half for overtime, extra pay for holidays, a 15-day vacation annually, and a general wage increase for all of at least 25 cents per day. These demands will form the chief discussion at the biennial international convention of the Brotherhood of Railroad Clerks, which will meet in this city next week with an attendance of delegates from all parts of the United States, Canada and Mexico. The legislative committee of the brotherhood of which W. E. Bowen, of New Orleans is chairman, will meet here tomorrow to complete its report and recommendations.

SEWER ISSUE REACHES COURT IN MAN GARB GIRL IN HIDING

SUIT IN EJECTMENT FILED YESTERDAY. ELGIN COUPLE ELOPE AND LIVE IN HILLS.

One Thousand Dollars Damages and Posses Pursue to Overtake and Find Elopers If Possible.

Suit in ejectment has been filed against the city of La Grande by J. H. Pearce through his counsel, W. B. Sargent in relation to the sewer line east of the city. To reach the disposal tank at the proper angle, it was found necessary to elevate the lower end of the sewer line and this fact has caused considerable negotiation in the county and out for several

The issue came to a focus yesterday afternoon, when, after the county court refused to grant a franchise to the city to leave its line on the highway as it was constructed, the suit was filed asking court orders to have the line removed from in front of the Pearce tract of some five acres, and also asking for \$1,000 damage money. It appears that the county did not grant, or was not asked to grant, a franchise at the time the city built the line along the highway leading to the disposal tank, and as noted, the city was forced to elevate the pipe line, and in this point Pearce brings suit. It is asserted that the owner cannot gain access to his property because he cannot drive over the line, and after futile attempts to come to an agreement, brought the suit noted. In the event that the suit should culminate as the complaint prays for, it will be necessary for the city to move the disposal tank and change the

AMPLE SUMS SUPPORT A SEPARATE DELEGATION TO GO FROM TEXAS BORDERS

WASHINGTON'S DELEGATION CENTER OF FIGHT—McHARG

Opposition to Taft in Washington, Says Contest Manager, Will Center Fight in Contest Struggle Over the Northwest Delegation—McHard Opens Offices at Chicago Today.

Colonel Feels Fine. New York, May 28.—"Bully," exclaimed Colonel Roosevelt at his desk at the Outlook office here when he was asked how he felt on the day of the primary election. He declared he would get every one of New Jersey's 28 delegates to the national convention. The polls close at 9 o'clock tonight.

Fort Worth, Tex., May 28.—With Roosevelt men in complete control the Taft delegates to the republican state convention which met here today bolted and announced they would send a cohosting delegation to Chicago.

The Wilson men were in complete control of the democratic state convention meeting here at noon today. It was predicted the New Jersey governor will get at least 32 district delegates, and eight delegates at large.

Expected Fight Fizzles. Although Roosevelt swept the state in the recent county primaries it was expected the uninstructed delegation would neutralize the former president's supremacy and a hot fight was looked for but when the convention opened it was plain that a majority of the uninstructed delegates favored Roosevelt and the Taft men immediately left the hall.

Bailey's Downfall Seen. There are 623 votes in the democratic convention of which Wilson controls more than half, with Judson Harmon second and Champ Clark third. The success of the Wilson ticket is considered a blow politically to Senator Joseph W. Bailey, who stumped the state against Wilson's candidacy. United States Senator Culberson will head the Wilson ticket.
