CHEMICAL FAILS TO GO UP HILL

Bay View Avenue Too Much for La France Machine on Try-Out--City Fire Department Automobiles Make It With Ease

The new LaFrance auto chemical paid a visit to this city yesterday afternoon to have a try-out before the members of the municipal council and Chief Thomas Harris of the fire department. Although the chemical showed that it has great speed qualities, it was rather shy on the hill climbing stunts and fell far short of the performance of the auto chemicals now owned by this city.

The chemical arrived at the Broad street engine house at 2 o'clock and was met by Mayor William P. Conroy, Commissioner of Finance Frank A. Turnbull, Commissioner of Streets George H. McPhetres, Water Commissioner Thomas Campbell 2nd., and Chief Thomas A. Harris.

The start was immediately made to see what the machine could do. The first trip was to Bay View avenue, off Western avenue, which is one of the toughest hills in the city to climb. The auto started at full speed up the hill, got about two-thirds of the way, sputtered, coughed and then stopped and stayed stopped. She was backed down the hill and another trial made, with the same result. On the trips up the hill the machine had several men aboard and a thousand feet of hose in the body of the machine.

From Bay View avenue, the chemical then went to Grant street, close by which it skimmed up with ease. From there it went to Lovers' Leap avenue and reached the peak of this hill in an easy fashion. The operator then showed what great speed the machine is capable of making by sending it through the streets about Myrtle street at a rate of speed close to 50

After the test the machine returned to the Broad street house where the hose was left and then it went over the road to Salem to give a demonstration there as the Witch city is to buy an auto chemical next week. The chemical is a powerful machine of 70 horsepower and is capable of going 60 miles an hour. She carries two chemical tanks, each of which holds 35 gallons of water and also has a water line. The rear part of the machine is divided into two parts each of which is capable of carrying 500 feet of hose.

After the auto had concluded its test the commissioners expressed a wish to see if the autos owned by the city could climb Bay View avenue where the other had met its Waterloo. Chief Harris first called out chemical three of Tower hill, which is a Knox machine. She arrived at the foot of the hill in short order. While the La France machine had made a flying start up the hill, the Knox auto was stopped on Western avenue and then sent up the hill. Mills, Not Cents, Count.

New York, May 27.—Another example of the manner in which Wall Street figures even in mills in estimating the probable value of securities which it desires to purchase was evidenced by the bids made for the issue of \$65,000,000 of four and a quarter per cent city bonds which are now being distributed. The average price secured by the city was 100.74, parcels of the bonds in varying sizes being awarded to 270 out of 366 bidders. The method of allotment is that of satisfying the highest bid first, then the next highest, for whatever number of bonds entire lot is exhausted. As an indication of the close figuring which is done before submitting bids may be cited the case of J. P. Morgan & company, who offered 100,4907 for the entire issue which even involved fractions of mills. This bid which proved to be about one-quarter of one per cent lower than the average received by the city was not regarded as particularly close by experts, although to the outsider it would seem to be. Last year the same firm missed securing the entire allotment of the \$60,000 bond issue by a figure falling below the average price by only seven cents on each thousand dollars, which is still regarded as something of a record in close figuring. While the price secured this year by the city for its bonds is a very small fraction lower than that which last year's issues brought, city officials seem to be pretty well satisfied in view of the generally bearish influence of an impending election.

NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD

SCALERS FIGHT WITH OWNER

ARRESTED MEN COME TO TOWN VOLUNTARILY.

Minam Camp Scene of Lively Battle Yesterday Morning.

After demanding another scaler on a timber contract which they had made with a man by the name of Eckhart, Marion McGee and Clifford Weaver, who were selling timber, struck Eckhart and a fight followed in Eckhart's cabin near the Minam yesterday morning.

This is the story told by Eckhart who came in today and had a warrant sworn out for the arrest of the men. He alleges that he was beaten up because he would not change log scalers and he demands protection under the law. McGee and Clifford Weaver are both well known in La Grande and bear good names. Just what there is to the controversy will be determined when the case is laid before the grand jury.

Sheriff Childers telephoned to McGee and Weaver telling them that warrants had been issued for them and they immediately started for La Grande without sending an officer after them.
