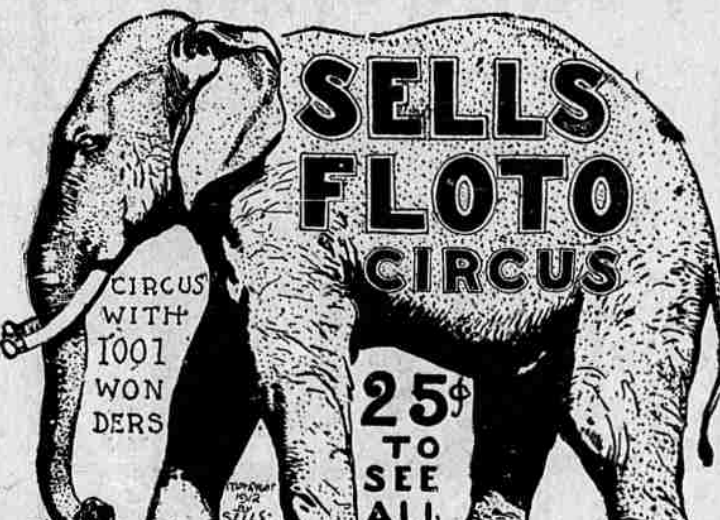

BRING FAIR CONTEST TO CITY

CHAUTAQUA WEEK TO HEAR CONTEST EXPLAINED.

Former Newspaper Man to Have Lecture Course Ready.

Arrangements for the state wide agricultural and industrial contest among the boys and girls of Oregon to be presented at the Grande Ronde chautauqua were made this week by Dr. W. D. McMillan and Calvin C. Thomason of Salem, formerly a newspaper man of this city. Mr. Thomason is now field manager for the contest and is returning from a tour of county in the interest of the movement.

It is hoped that State Superintendent L. R. Alderman may be able to be at the chautauqua on educational day or on grange day. When he is able to be here he and Contest Manager Thomason will present the movement with the assistance of other speakers who will be secured to handle the different phases of the subject.

"We realize that the date of the state fair is unfortunately early for Eastern Oregon," said Contest Manager Thomason while here, "but we are hoping to have every county represented there. Eastern Oregon is as early as the coast counties and all produce will not be fully matured, but will have to be judged on a comparative basis. The schools of Union county should at least send down some poultry, pigs, and woodwork and domestic science. It is hard for me to get used to the soil of other sections of the country after being so familiar with the richness and exceeding fertility of the Grande Ronde valley and the fair will seem imperfect to me unless there are some exhibits from this valley."

Bronson and McFarland Again.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 28.—Hoosier fight fans are looking forward with eager anticipation to the fight to be staged here tomorrow night between Packey McFarland of Chicago and Ray Bronson, the local fighter. It will be a ten round affair and will take place in a specially-built arena at the Indianapolis baseball park. The city is now crowded with sport enthusiasts who have been attracted by the big automobile race of next Thursday, and the promoters of the fight expect to have at least 15,000 spectators at the ring side. Both Bronson and McFarland finished training today and are reported in the pink of condition for the go. It will be their second meeting in the ring. Their first encounter took place in New Orleans nearly three years ago, when they fought 20 rounds to a draw.

"Kitty" League Opens Season.

Chicago, Ill., May 28.—The Kentucky-Indiana-Tennessee baseball league, popularly known as the "Kitty" league, opened its season today with President Passett and the several club owners optimistic over the outlook. The circuit of the organization is the same as last year, with the exception that Nashville has the franchise formerly held by Fulton. For the initial games Hopkinsville appeared at Clarksville, Paducah at Cairo and Evansville at Henderson. The season will close Labor day.

Sunday School Workers to Parade

Elgin, Ill., May 28.—Sunday School workers from every section of the state are here in attendance at the 54th annual state convention of the Illinois Sunday Schools, which opens here for a session extending over and many noted church and Sunday school workers are among the speakers scheduled to address the convention and to participate in the institutes arranged for every one of the three days. The spectacular feature of the convention will be the big parade of the organized men's class on Thursday evening.
