

CAPTAIN LORD NOT DISMISSED

HIS ABSENCE FROM CALIFORNIAN IS EXPLAINED.

BOSTON REPORTS TO THAT EFFECT ARE STOUTLY DENIED

Captain of Steamer Blamed for Negligence in Not Going to the aid of the Titanic Will Not Be Removed From His Post—Captain Rostron Lionized by New York Women.

London, May 29.—A broadside was hurled at Senator Smith's speech on the Titanic disaster delivered in the United States senate yesterday, by London newspapers this evening. The Evening Standard refers to it as a "rhetorical haphazard, filled with wild verbiage and reckless deductions."

Liverpool, May 29.—Emphatic denial of a Boston report that Captain Lord was to be relieved of the command of the liner Californian because that vessel failed to heed the assistance calls of the Titanic, were made today by General Manager Roper of the Leyland line. It was explained by Roper that the Californian was at sea under another captain because Lord was compelled to remain in London to testify before the board of trade inquiry. He said that Captain Lord would resume his run as soon as possible.

CARPATIA CREW LIONIZED.

Captain Flees When Bery of Society Women Surround Him.

New York, May 29.—Captain A. H. Rostron, commander of the Carpathia which arrived here today and which saved more than 800 people from the Titanic, stammered, turned red and fled to his cabin today when a bevy of society women and survivors of the disaster tried to lionize him. The captain was overhauled by the women, however. He was presented with a loving cup, and the crew with bronze medals. As the Carpathia swung into the docks here today, Rostron was given an ovation by a crowd of several thousand. As soon as the passengers had landed, a committee of the Titanic survivors headed by Mrs. J. J. Brown of Denver boarded the vessel. Approaching Rostron, Mrs. Brown said, "You dear man, I think you are the greatest man in the world." Captain Rostron, after making his unsuccessful attempt to escape, had his crew mustered and the presentation of the loving cup and medals was made. The medals show the Carpathia in the act of approaching the Titanic's life boats.

Monument for Barbara Etchells

Frederick, Md., May 29.—The initial steps have just been taken here looking to the formation of a suitable memorial to Barbara Etchells, the heroine of a child's famous poem. It is proposed to erect a monument in the Olivet cemetery, where the remains are to be reinterred after lying for nearly a year in a German Reformed graveyard. The new grave will be located close by that of Francis Scott Key, the author of "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Conference Adjourns

Minneapolis, May 29.—The quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church adjourned this afternoon. It has been in session nearly a month.

HONG TUCK, MERCHANT DIES

CHINESE FUNERAL SERVICES TO BE HELD THURSDAY.

WAS PIONEER IN CITY

Hong Tuck, the veteran Chinese merchant who has been local emperor of Chinese colonies both in a social and business way for many years, died this evening at 7:30 o'clock as a result of cancer of the liver. He has been ailing for several days, seriously ill a portion of the time, and death was anticipated for several hours before he expired.

The funeral services will be held Thursday and the elaborate rites of funeral service enacted by Chinese subjects will be bestowed upon the veteran. He was 60 years of age.

It is expected that well known and prominent Chinese of Baker and Portland will attend the services which, when carried to their fullest detail, are unusually novel to the Occidental. They are based on Chinese "superstitions" and rites and usages centuries old.

Hong Tuck conducted a general store for many years on Adams avenue and recently has been interested in restaurant enterprises. Though reported to be rich it is affirmed that he actually had but little cash.

WORLD-FAMED HORSE BOUGHT

N. K. WEST NOW OWNER OF DU-NURE EDWARDS

Purchase Price Is Six Thousand—Is Undeclared in All Contests.

Dunure Edwards, conceded to be the finest specimen of Clydes in the United States, and the grandson of Baron's Pride, the sire of all the greatest prize winners in Europe, and himself undefeated in all the prize rings of the United States where exhibited, has been purchased from Salt Lake parties by N. K. West of this city, and should arrive in the city tomorrow. The purchase price was \$6,000.00.

Animal Weighs 3400

This splendid specimen of the Clyde breed weighs 2400 pounds and is probably the heaviest horse in Union county today. His prize winning abilities are touted for and near in European horse centers. He has never been beaten, in fact, his ancestry claims undefeated show honors throughout Europe. On Dunure Edwards' dam side he is a pure bred and as classically bred as the sire's side. The animal is the son of Royal Edwards who like the grand-sire, has carried off blue ribbons in the world's greatest showings. Dunure Edwards may be exhibited in the Union stock show but Mr. West is undecided as to that in view of the long travel he is now undergoing. He will be exhibited "informally" in the city tomorrow, or if delayed in arrival, when he does come, and eventually will be taken to Commonwealth stock ranch on the Grande Ronde river. It is doubtful if any single specimen of the Clyde family has ever been brought to Union county with greater world renown than this one.

ROOSEVELT SWEEPS NEW JERSEY PRIMARY, TAKING ALL

Ratio of Victory Between Two and Three to One—La Follette Showing Exceedingly Poor—Colonel Crins

Newark, May 29.—Practically complete returns from the primaries in New Jersey show that Roosevelt carried every district in the state with a comfortable plurality, except in the sixth where his plurality is 300. This means he will get the solid New Jersey delegation in the cities Roosevelt led 2 to 1 and in the country about 3 to 1. La Follette made a poor race, failing to carry a single city or town.

Wilson carried ten of the 12 congressional districts, the other two being controlled by Senator Smith, hostile to Wilson.

Colonel's Smile Broad. Oyster Bay, N. Y., May 29.—Roosevelt wore more than a usually expansive grin here today. He said he had no comment to make on the New Jersey primary which he carried. The colonel today turned his attention to the members of the national committee with the intention of obtaining control of the temporary organization at the Chicago convention. This afternoon he leaves for Gettysburg where he is to deliver a memorial day address. He smiled but refused to answer when asked how soon after his nomination he expected to open his campaign.

REVOLUTION GROWING WORSE DAILY IS REPORT.

The Pacific Arrives at Scene of Troubles in Cuba.

Washington, May 29.—The United States transport Pacific reached Guantanamo, Cuba today with 775 marines aboard according to navy department advice. The Pacific is prepared to send marines to Oriente province to protect American property. Officials state that the department declared today the presence of the marines in Oriente would be justified because of the lawless destruction of plantations and factories. The rebels under General Estenoz are hourly growing and more menacing.

SPEED FIENDS VIET THURSDAY

INDIANAPOLIS SPEEDWAY IS TO KIRKATE WITH SPEED

DARE DEVILS ENTER

Greatest Motor Speedway to Be Scene of Races Tomorrow.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 29.—Practice for the second annual 500 mile international speedstakes race, to be run on the Indianapolis motor speedway tomorrow, is ended and the drivers and their assistants are today putting their racing cars in final condition for the great test of speed and endurance. There is every prospect of exceedingly fast time in the race as the practice during the past few days has shown that the course is fast some of the drivers having driven laps at close to 100 miles an hour. On account of the number of prominent automobiles concerns which have withdrawn from racing the field tomorrow will not be as large as last year. But the objection last season was that too many cars were allowed to start, and the management claimed the large field was to a great extent responsible for the accidents. This year's event was limited to 30 starters, and the entry list closed with 27 nominations. Nearly every American pilot of national reputation

STEAMER HITS FRENCH LINER

BOTH CAPTAINS BLAMED FOR ACCIDENT.

French Boat Badly Crippled and Passengers Hurriedly Saved.

New York, May 29.—The steamer Berwind of the New York & Porto Rico line rammed and seriously damaged a French liner with 18 first class passengers, and 50 steerage passengers aboard, near here today. They collided in a fog. The Hudson was rushing toward the New York harbor when the accident occurred. The vessels Dalzell and Dalzell, summoned by wireless, rushed to the assistance of the disabled liner which was sinking when finally backed to the foot of 72nd Brooklyn, where the passengers were transferred to tugs and rescued.

Both Captains Blamed

The Berwind was badly damaged about the bows, and was towed to Erie Basin with all pumps working and two tugs alongside keeping her from sinking. The accident made the necessary repairs. Each captain blames the other for the accident.

Kentucky Knights Templar

Paris, Ky., May 29.—Paris is in rain attire in honor of the Kentucky Knights Templar, whose 55th annual convocation opened here today with the prospect of being one of the most notable gatherings ever held by the fraternity in the Blue Grass state. Commanderies are here from Louisville, Lexington, Paducah, Henderson and numerous other cities. The convocation will continue over tomorrow.

General Booth Still Blind

London, May 29.—Physicians attending General Booth, head of the Salvation Army, admitted here tonight that he is probably hopelessly blind. It is not believed that the operation recently performed on Booth's eyes for the removal of cataracts, will prove successful.

Early Adjournment Seen

Washington, May 29.—Prospects for an early adjournment of congress, probably June 15, were made brighter today, following informal caucuses of the leaders of both the senate and house.

DARROW KNOWN OF BRIBE

"INSIDE" FACTS OF THE TRIAL

BERT FRANKLIN TELLS

SICKNESS DELAYS DARROW PROSECUTION TODAY

Bert Franklin Agrees on Stand This Morning and Swore That He Advised Darrow of Having Bribed Juror Bain in McNamara Trial—Gave Bain \$100 of \$1,000.

Los Angeles, May 29.—With Bert H. Franklin, the self confessed briber as a witness, the trial of Clarence Darrow charged with bribery in connection with the McNamara trial proceeded today. Franklin testified he bribed Juror Bain giving him \$100 as part of the \$1,000 he was to get if he voted to acquit the McNamaras. Assistant District Attorney Ford asked Franklin if he had reported the matter to Darrow and Franklin said he did the day following the trial's close.

Because of the death of a member of the family of Horace Apple, associate counsel for the defense, it was decided there will be no afternoon session of the case and continuance will be made till Friday morning.

"It's about time to get busy with the jury," Franklin quoted Darrow as saying to him on October 5, 1911. The next day, he said, Darrow gave him a check for \$1,000 to be used in buying the vote as a juror of Robert M. Bain, who later became the first sworn juror in the trial. He said that he had known Bain for 20 years and that he arranged for the corruption of the juror. This bit of evidence was brought out yesterday afternoon when Franklin was first called to the stand.

Franklin swore that the money with which he bribed Bain was given to him for that purpose by Darrow.

\$25,000,000 Railway for Australia

London, May 29.—The first practical step towards the construction of Australia's proposed \$25,000,000 railway was taken today, when bids for 135,000 tons of steel rails were received at the high commissioner's office in this city. The railway is to be the biggest enterprise of its kind ever undertaken in Australia. The line will be known as the Federal Transcontinental railway and will extend from Port Augusta in South Australia to Kalbarrie in Western Australia. The route is more than 1,000 miles in length and a considerable portion of it extends across a desert. The government proposes to do the entire work itself without the intervention of a contractor.

Big Welcome for Morse at Old Home

Bath, Me., May 29.—When Charles W. Morse, the former king of finance arrives in Bath next week he will receive a welcome the like of which has never been given any son of the Pine Tree state in his home community. A committee headed by Mayor Frank A. Small is actively at work completing arrangements for the reception and welcome. Mr. Morse and his wife, who has been abroad with him, will be met at the station and escorted to the Morse homestead. Later a public reception will be held. It is understood that the former banker intends to spend the entire summer here with his wife, his daughter and his sister.

Governor's Son o Wed.

Claremont, Cal., May 29.—Score of out of town guests arrived here today for the wedding of Miss Amy Bowles, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Bowles, and Hiram Johnson, Jr., son of the governor of California. The wedding takes place this evening at the Pine Tree.
