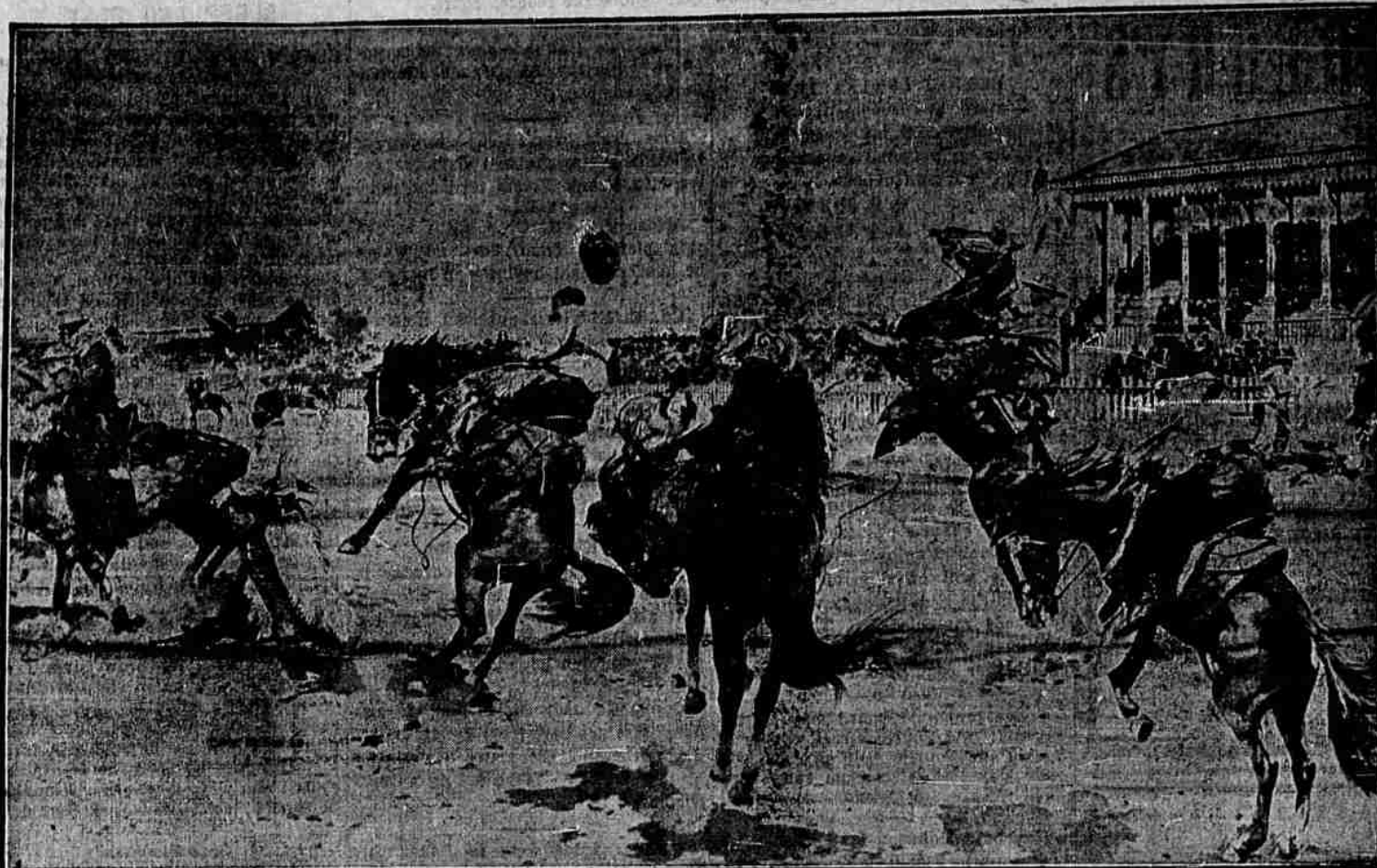

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 3rd day of April, 1912, creating improvement district No. 50, and designating Main avenue as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council, on the 25th day of April, 1912, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Main avenue, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon cement sidewalk, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Main avenue, from the west curb line of First street to the east line of Walnut street.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

Lots 6 and 7, block 1, lots 6 and 7, block 4; lots 6 and 7, block 7; lots 1 and 12, block 2; lots 1 and 12, block 3 and lots 1 and 12, block 8, Romig's addition to La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$2,076.57. That the council will, on the 19th day of June, 1912, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
